BRECKLAND LOCAL PLAN CONSULTATION

I can now report that, as many of you will have seen, Breckland District Council's Issues and Options Consultation is now 'live' and runs until 19 May. North Elmham Parish Council urges residents to take part in the consultation which looks at the strategy for proposed development in the Local Plan to 2046. There will be other rounds of consultation which look at individual sites proposed for housing in the parish.

Of particular concern to the Parish Council and to CANT (Campaign Against the New Town), which is supported by the Parish Council, is the question of a New Town in Bintree, Billingford and North Elmham. You may well want to respond to all or many of the 60 consultation questions, but at least we suggest you answer question 13 which asks: 'should there be a new settlement Garden Town/ Village developed within Breckland?' If you are against the proposed New Town, we suggest you answer 'no' to that question. There is also a space for an explanation (unless at time of writing you use the online submission option via the Commonplace tool). This consultation is not about specific sites, so the Parish Council will add this explanation:

There is no need for a new settlement if other growth options are followed, such as organic growth of existing market towns with policies in place to ensure vacant brownfield sites are developed. In addition, we question what we feel are higher than necessary housing target numbers for the District. Given the overriding need for sustainable development which also address Climate Change, housing numbers should be kept to the minimum required by central government, rather than pursuing growth beyond that. In addition, the urban extensions of Thetford and Attleborough can be considered as new settlements, certainly in terms of their size.

With these large new settlements, there is no need for any more new settlements in the District.

If, in despite of these concerns an additional new settlement was to be considered, there are various criteria listed below, which should all be followed before any location for such a settlement could be allocated. Any site would have to have existing transport and other necessary infrastructure, or 100% certainty that it would be delivered before the new settlement was occupied - this would be good ("A" road and preferably dual-carriageway) road links and commercial rail with a station in the new settlement. There would need to be sufficient jobs in the new settlement to ensure it did not become a commuter dormitory town or village. It must not harm the local environment, landscape or wildlife, including the risk of polluting run-off or groundwater. There would need to be adequate water-resources and sewerage treatment. It should not be sited primarily on BMV (Best and Most Versatile) agricultural land. It must have the necessary schools and NHS facilities in place before occupation. It should not contribute to Climate Change e.g. by being car-dependent.

A major problem with locating a new settlement is that at present this is guided by the availability of a site as promoted by a landowner/developer. It is therefore not being selected because of any factors other than the desire for profit. The location of new settlements should not be left to the whim of landowners, but should be selected by government, and be chosen because of a number of factors e.g. availability of employment, geographical and spatial factors, transport, natural and historic

environment, landscape, and socioeconomic factors., as well as consideration of the factors in the previous paragraph.

The consultation can be completed online using the Commonplace tool, or a form completed and emailed in, or posted. In addition, CANT will be distributing a leaflet door-to-door, with a focus on question 13, which residents may want to complete and return at the time.

The Parish Council will also be answering other key questions for North Elmham, including the view that the Local Plan should keep with the concept of settlement boundaries, that the bulk of new housing should be in existing towns, and that affordable housing should be the priority for any new housing in villages.

NORTH ELMHAM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

WEDNESDAY 1ST MARCH

The following information is taken from the Draft PC minutes and may be expanded where the Editors feel more explanation is necessary. The full official minutes can be viewed in the Post Office and on the Community website, once approved.

Councillors Present Were: Mr. M. Phillips (acting Chairman), Miss A. Ferris, Mr. T. Fitzalan Howard, Mr. B. Gee, Mr. P. Grainger, Mr. J. Labouchere, Mr. N. Markwell, Mr. M. Rayner and Mr. C. Smith Also in Attendance: Mr. K. Webb (Clerk), Mr. G. Bambridge (District Councillor) and two parishioners.

Apologies for absence: Mrs. J. Borgnis and Mrs. A. Keeble.

Public Participation

- a) Mr. Humphrey Borgnis advised that, after the recent CANT meeting, contact details of those present were taken. A Gmail account has been set up with all names of those at the meeting and Mr. John Hoskins has agreed to be the campaign co-ordinator in the short term.
- b) It was confirmed that CANT is effectively a conglomerate of local parishes and North Elmham is fully involved.
- c) It was felt that the pump at the top of the village (Pump Street) no longer looks like a pump. A new casing is needed but this matter was considered some years ago and, at the time, the amount required was regarded as too much. Mr. Phillips is to obtain a new quotation.

Land Management Matters

Village Green: A tree has lost a large branch, (Mr. Gee has attended to the matter). The young person on the Police Community Resolution Scheme has helped to clear the brook and another person of a similar age turned up to help. A tree surgeon is to be asked to look at the trees.

Cathedral Meadows: Brown and Co recommended that the Stewardship Agreement be extended for a further five years which was agreed by all. Mr. Fitzalan Howard said there are about 33.25 acres and the annual sum produced is £2,698. The land is for the benefit and use of the local community.

Broom Green: Mr. Labouchere said that the pond will need attention this year. A digger may not be required to clear it out. The estimated cost is in the region of £1,000.

Bridleway on disused railway line and other railway linked matters: The Railway Company is looking to clear soil off the top of the bridge in Church Lane as there is a weight issue. A mini digger will be needed, and it will be necessary for both the Church Lane path and the path under the bridge to

be closed for a day. The Railway Company is to be asked to put a piece in Elmham News advising of the situation.

Prince William Wood: Mr. Markwell has been talking to Flagship Housing about the metal gate but a conclusion regarding ownership has not been reached.

Church Meadow: Mr. Fitzalan Howard said that water runs against the church wall on the land behind the church. The church personnel are investigating the possibility of having a pipe and soakaway installed.

Allotments

Work on the taps has been completed.

Street Lights

Mr. Markwell reported that work on the Pump Street light has been completed and the job in Eastgate Street is to be finished by UK Power Networks.

Highway Matters

Highways Department has acknowledged that the Eastgate Street drain requires attention. It was mentioned that a road sweeper has visited the village. Mr. Gee has attended to the allotment sign.

Pavilion and Playing Field

Mr. Smith reported that the North Elmham Football Club has been given the Parish Council's bank account details so that they can pay the money they owe. The work on the electrics has been completed but a new mains unit is needed. A quotation of £1,556 has been obtained and all agreed to proceed with this work (proposed by Mr. Labouchere and seconded by Miss Ferris). The defibrillator is up and running.

Brookside Development Update

The development is to be renamed Boars Hill and an explanation for this name has to be given in Elmham News.

Defibrillators

The defibrillator has been activated.

Call for Sites Update – Breckland Council

Mr. Rayner reported that the issues and options consultation is to be launched in early to mid-March and will last for eight weeks. He is to write to Breckland Council as the consultation process does not give the opportunity to comment on individual sites. CANT proposes to circulate to residents, by way of a door to door flyer, a questionnaire based on key questions from the consultation. Mr. Rayner is providing monthly updates for Elmham News.

Pavilion Funding

Mr. Grainger prepared the plan illustrating what is required as agreed but Norfolk F.A. has subsequently advised that they are to be part of a larger scheme which could support a bigger project. It was agreed that Mr. Grainger, together with the Chairman and Messrs Fitzalan Howard, Phillips and Smith would have a discussion regarding the three existing buildings (Pavilion, Eastgate Centre and Institute).

THE ORIGINS OF THE PAVILION

With the much-mooted extension of the Pavilion a 'hot' subject now for the Parish Council, I append a brief run-down on how the current building came to be:

The then Chairman of the Parish Council, Peter Wade-Martins, came to me in 1992 to ask if I could come up with suggestions for a new Pavilion on the Playing Field as the old one, built at the end of WW2, had passed it's 'use-by' date. I recently had returned from my year-long horse-ride in the Andes. With nothing particular in mind this was an opportunity I needed, to get myself back in the traces.

With the help of a draughtsman, planning permission was obtained from Breckland, a demolition gang removed the old and rather battered 'hut' that had served for too many years and a contract let for the groundworks to proceed. The Pavilion would consist of a main community space, two changing rooms with individual electric hot-water tanks for the showers, adequate kitchen, and toilet facilities. A Scorers' room and window would be a bonus. Storage for chairs and tables would be a necessity. The finance could be arranged for a building costing no more than £25k.

To build this brick, block, truss, and tile construction would require very tight control. It was a time of much temporary "laying-off" of tradesmen for national reasons of economy. I asked through the—much younger—Elmham News if there were any bricklayers, carpenters, electricians or plumbers within the village who would be prepared to work for a couple of months for rock-bottom pay (I do not remember there being a statutory minimum wage at the time), and by the 6th December we had a team of experts all helping to construct the project. At the time they were laid-off from their normal jobs, they could not be working and receive unemployment benefit.

As can be seen in the photographs, building continued apace. There was talk of the use of the 'upstairs' space as a skittlesalley, but my development of a 'lift-up' staircase became too expensive, and the first floor has not so far been developed.

The building has certainly proved its worth over 30 years and is used regularly for many sports meetings for which it was particularly designed and also for evening meetings, especially of the Parish Council. The then Chairman of the Canaries, Robert Chase came to open the new building on 22nd April 1992. By then it had not been decorated but it became in full use during the year.

ELMHAM GUIDES TAKE OFF INTO SPACE!

In March the Guides went off to have a space themed weekend at Patteson Lodge, our Girlguiding Norfolk holiday house near Coltishall. Thankfully the blizzards cleared up in time for us to go! Saturday was taken up with space related activities including Alien Hunt - a real life version of Cluedo when each person had to 'murder' another with a given object and place eg Captain in a bedroom with a pencil. This involved much plotting and subterfuge!

Evie and Poppy wrote about some of their other favourite activities;

We have been doing lots of fun activities. One was to make a slime planet. We mixed PVA glue with Bicarbonate of Soda and contact lens solution. We added some food colouring, it was really sticky

but then turned into slime. We make lava lamps with water, vegetable oil and food colouring, then put in a vitamin C tablet to watch it work. It looked amazing.'

'We made rockets out of plastic bottles. We put in half a bottle of vinegar and a teaspoon of bicarbonate of soda and it shot into the air! WIVES PLUS ALL

At our monthly meeting on Thursday 9th March in the Memorial Hall we were visited by Janet, the Veterinary Nurse who works at the Charity PACT Animal Sanctuary which is situated at River Farm, Woodrising, here in Norfolk. IN 1994, People for Animal Care Trust was the inspiration of a lady called Chris (1946-2019) who was the Founder along with her husband George. The Sanctuary is for all animals both domesticated and wild, thus promoting animal good health and welfare. There is also a Therapy Centre at PACT and over the years many people with complex mental and physical disability needs have been helped by the therapy of the animals at PACT.

Janet focused her talk on the welfare of wild life but in particular of hedgehogs which when they come to PACT for whatever reason such as parental abandonment, illness, failure to thrive or to hibernate, because of low weight and also being too young to do so they are housed in the Wildlife Hospital. Baby hedgehogs then having been rehabilitated with correct growth and weight can return to the wild. A wild hedgehog will be subjected to predators and unfortunately accidents, but can live for 2-3 years, whereas a domesticated hedgehog can do so for 7-10 years. One important thing Janet mentioned was, that people put bread and milk out for them but in fact this diet is not good for them they benefit far better from dried dog or cat food. In autumn PACT can be seen in the Wildlife Hospital to care for over 500 baby hedgehogs who are too young to hibernate. Baby hedgehog spines at birth are soft and white but soon turn in to hard spikes. In Summer the hedgehog rooms are given over to 500 plus young fledglings and nestlings. The Field Shelter incorporated into the Wildlife Hospital is used for flight practice. PACT also has several Charity shops including the one in Dereham.

Our thanks went to Janet for a very interesting talk which we could have listened to all night!

NORTH ELMHAM WILDLIFE

This month I'm going to focus on naturalised wildlife. By naturalised I mean species that are not native or indigenous here but are now sustaining established populations here, surviving and reproducing in the wild. I don't include species that have colonised naturally but only those that have arrived here through human intervention (although that's a grey area when it comes to species that have colonised as a result of man-made climate change).

So the escaped Budgerigar that a lady in the village phoned me about yesterday isn't naturalised as, although escaped budgies are sometimes found in the wild, they don't generally survive in the wild for very long and we don't have a population of wild-living and breeding Budgerigars in the UK. Ring-necked Parakeets on the other hand do survive in the UK and find all they need in the wild to sustain a healthy population, so we do have these handsome (but horribly noisy) parrots naturalised in many parts of south-east England – and, in just the last few years, closer to home in Norwich.

For the most part naturalised wildlife isn't really a good thing. Naturalised species can cause real damage to our native wildlife, either through direct competition or through damage to habitat or even through hybridisation which, over time, can compromise the genetic purity of the native species. Some naturalised species seem to be pretty benign though, apparently not having any adverse impact on our native wildlife. But good, bad or indifferent, naturalised species make up a significant part of our wildlife now and include some quite spectacular species.


One such beauty is the Mandarin (photo 1), a small duck from China which has long been popular in wildfowl collections. Many have escaped and, after first becoming established in the southeast, smaller populations now exist all over the country. I haven't seen them

in North Elmham for a while (the photo was from the Broads) but they used to be regular around Guist Bridge and I'm told they were often seen on the river towards Billingford too. They prefer wooded ponds and nest high up in trees occupying an ecological niche that doesn't suit the ducks that normally breed in Norfolk, so they probably aren't too much of a threat to our native wildlife.

Many of our gamebirds are non-native and millions of Pheasants (photo 2) and Red-legged Partridges (photo 3) are reared in captivity and released for shooting every year. But although the population is boosted by new introductions, they are also pretty well-established surviving (if they don't get shot or run over) and breeding in the wild. Although Redlegged Partridges (also known as French Partridges) may not be the primary cause for the dramatic decline of our native Grey Partridge (sometimes called English Partridge), they certainly do have an impact. The real problem with these nonnative gamebirds is the sheer number of birds released every year - over 62 million Pheasants and Red-legged Partridges were released in the UK in 2018 and it's estimated that at its peak the total biomass of these two species (that is the total weight of all of them put together) is about the same as the combined total biomass of all of our other birds put together. Recent studies have shown that in areas where high numbers are released there is a considerable negative impact on our invertebrate populations and some evidence suggests there is transmission of diseases from captive-bred gamebirds to native wild birds. Having said that, the industry of gamebird shooting also has some strong positive conservation impacts - the supplementary feeding and cover crops really benefit some of our declining songbirds for example. Maybe the best solution isn't to stop releasing gamebirds altogether as some are calling for, but to restrict the numbers released each year.

One of our most popular naturalised birds is the Little Owl (photo 4). Introduced to the UK in the nineteenth century this species is now one of commonest owls, although they seem to have declined locally in recent years. They become active towards dusk but while there is still plenty of light to see them and, as far as I know, have no significant negative impact on our native wildlife populations.

As well as birds, many of the mammals we see most often round here are naturalised. It is believed that Rabbits (photo 5) were introduced by the Normans, although there is also evidence that the Romans brought them here long before that. Brown Hare (photo 6) has been here even longer – brought here from adjacent parts of Europe in the Iron Age.

Sadly, our native Red Squirrel is now extinct in Norfolk - I wonder if any Elmham News readers remember seeing them here in North Elmham? Let me know if you do! The reason for their demise is another naturalised species, the Grey Squirrel (photo 7). Grey Squirrels carry a disease that they pass on to Red Squirrels, but although the Grey Squirrels can survive it, the Red Squirrels are less able to tolerate it. They also out-complete Red Squirrels for space and food (for example they eat the acorns before they're ripe enough for Red Squirrels). It's not just Red Squirrels that suffer through their presence either – for example they cause damage to trees by stripping their bark.

Most of the species covered so far were brought here intentionally, although in some cases they may not have been released into the wild deliberately. But Brown Rats (photo 8), our only common rat, were brought here accidentally, carried on ships. Another non-native mammal we often see in and around North Elmham is the Muntjac (photo 9), a small deer that was introduced from China in the twentieth century.



I was going to write about naturalised insects and other invertebrates too, and perhaps some of the naturalised plants as well, but I've written enough for one month so maybe I'll cover them in another piece some other time. Suffice to say for now that the number of naturalised bird and mammal species is tiny compared to the number of invertebrates that now make North Elmham their home. Some of our commonest moths are native to Australia or Madeira or other far-flung parts of the globe. Most are assumed to have been imported accidentally, probably as larvae or eggs attached to plants imported for planting in our gardens or for the timber industry.

Thankfully we still have lots of native wildlife here to enjoy as well as a few exotic species. I'm always pleased to hear from villagers who let me know what they've seen. This month I heard about a Snipe that Melanie photographed feeding in her garden (what a great bird to see in your garden!) and a Buzzard that Beryl saw sitting outside her house in Spencer Close – we're used to seeing them in the countryside around the village but it's more unusual to see one in the middle of the village surrounded by houses. 

HONEY

Manuka

In the bee keeping world, this is a very hot topic as for instance, the production of Manuka honey. There are only 2,500 tonnes of honey produced and yet 10,000 tonnes are sold worldwide!! New Zealand is the only country in the world to have formalized the scientific definition of Manuka honey. This particular honey has natural occurring compounds that gives it special healing and medicinal qualities. Because of these qualities some honey labelled as Manuka actually contains other syrups but can still be sold at a much higher price than other honey. When you buy a jar of genuine Manuka look for the MGO number, the higher the number the better the quality and the higher the price. (MGO stands for methylglyoxal!) The legal requirements for Manuka honey are, sadly, only law in New Zealand meaning other countries can import and dilute this product. When buying Manuka honey make sure you look at the label to say it has been "packed" in New Zealand.

Raw Honey

Raw honey is taken from the hive in frames, de-capped, spun out in a stainless steel spinner, filtered and bottled.

The following is an excerpt from Diabetes UK, "Honey can be very beneficial if taken in moderation. A tablespoon of RAW honey has about 60 calories and 17g of carbohydrates. Honey also contains many vitamins and minerals including vitamin Magnesium, potassium and calcium. It is also an antioxidant which helps to prevent and slows cell damage."

Processed Honey

Processed honey undergoes a filtration process and is pasteurised (exposed to high heat) to destroy the yeast and create a longer shelf life. Processed honey is smoother but the filtration and

pasteurisation process does remove some of the nutrients and antioxidants.

The following is taken from Beekeepers Journal, "Due to the demand for honey in the UK, we imported 52,000 tonnes in 2020, China being the main export country for many years. Concern is growing about the contents of the honey. Sugar syrup is added and as technology advances it becomes more difficult and more expensive to analyse the actual contents of the honey. The label clearly states honey but does not list the extras added to keep down the cost."

The question we ask ourselves is why doesn't the government stop this practice? The answer is that it's extremely expensive and they would have to use a nuclear magnetic resonance machine to detect different syrups and honeys to which they would need a database of the different constituents of different honeys. So, in a word, it is too expensive.

However, the American Beekeepers association are taking the importers of honey from Asia to court to stop the importation of fraudulent honey. The British Beekeepers Association are trying to get a motion before Parliament to state on the label the country of origin. This would at least give us all the opportunity to make an informed decision on which honey we choose to buy.

And finally, the bees have been very active in the recent warmer days collecting pollen from catkins, crocuses and snowdrops. This is an indication that the queen has started to lay more eggs so there are new workers in the coming spring as the old workers that have overwintered die off.

Hoping for a warm spring.

ST MARY'S CHURCH

The first week of April takes us into Holy Week, beginning on Palm Sunday, 2nd April.

The Palm Sunday service begins joyfully, as we remember Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem. "A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds were shouting:

'Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!' " Matthew 21:1-11

At church, we begin the service outside. Our palm crosses are blessed and then we move into the church, singing a song of praise to Jesus (Ride on, ride on, in majesty). The mood quickly changes, however, as we enter into Christ's passion: his arrest, suffering and death on the cross. Matthew 27:11-54

During the rest of Holy Week, there are other opportunities to come together to reflect on this most sombre week. Sombre, yet deeply moving, before we once again celebrate Jesus' Resurrection on Easter Day.

Every year, I'm reminded of what the experience of being one of Jesus' disciples must have been like, as they accompanied him through his last days. The dinner at the house of Mary, Martha and Lazarus, when Mary poured costly perfume over Jesus' feet. Jesus' rage at the traders and money-changers in the Temple; and finally, the events of Maundy Thursday and Good Friday.

One of Jesus' final acts at the Last Supper was to wash his disciples' feet – the job of a servant. He was demonstrating the servant-nature of his leadership, as an example to them and to all those who wish to be his disciples. The word 'minister' means just that – "to render aid or service".

As a Minister of the Church, I would find it difficult – impossible even – to experience the joy of Easter, without first accompanying Jesus through his Passion. You would be most welcome to join us on this journey (please see the list of services).


