NORTH ELMHAM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

WEDNESDAY 4TH JUNE 2025

The following information is taken from the Draft PC minutes and may be expanded where the Editors feel more explanation is necessary. The full official minutes can be viewed in the Post Office and on the Community website, once approved.

Councillors Present Were: Mr. P. Grainger (Chairman), Mr. M. Phillips (Vice Chairman), Miss A. Ferris, Mr. T. Fitzalan Howard, Mr. B. Gee, Mrs. A. Keeble, Mr. N. Markwell, Mr. M. Rayner, Mr. C. Smith and Mr. J.Sowinski.

Also in Attendance: Mr. K. Webb (Clerk), Mr. G. Bambridge (District Councillor) and one parishioner.

Apologies for Absence: Mr. F. Gillespie.

Public Participation

Concern was expressed that the Union Jack flag had not been flown in the village on VE Day. It was explained that, unfortunately, it was not possible to fly the flag at the Institute on that day as it was broken with a damaged rope. It was confirmed that it is the intention to fly the flag, after it has been mended, on VJ Day on 15th August.

Updated Information And Matters Arising

Land Management Matters

Village Green: At the entrance from Eastgate Street, a rail has rotted and been replaced by Mr.Gee. The tower has been strengthened. The general view is that the standard of grass cutting, carried out by the new contractor, is excellent.

Millennium Wood (and Jubilee Wood):

A lot of cutting has been done by Mr. Sowinski and two volunteers. It is hoped to arrange a work party in the near future.

The use of a chipper has been kindly donated and it is the intention to leave the wood on the ground.

Bridleway on disused railway line and other railway linked matters: It

has been noted that a wagon has been moved to a prominent position close to the crossing gate.

Street Lights

A light near the Eastgate Centre is currently out. This will be reported.

Highway Matters

The Chairman has had a meeting with the installer of the village gates and the Speedwatch team to confirm the precise positioning. There has been no response from Norfolk County Council to the request for an update regarding the temporary bus stop at the junction of the County School Station.

The cameras at Station Road and Pump Street have had solar energy supplies installed and six new locks have been ordered. The new dog bin for the Boars Hill car park is to be put in place as soon as the land is transferred to the Parish Council. The installation cannot take place until the legal formalities have been completed.

Pavilion and Playing Field

Paint has been applied to the bus shelter and the graffiti has been removed. The outside is to be painted as well. CCTV cameras are to be considered. Sincere thanks were expressed to the volunteers for this work. Biffa and Breckland Council have produced quotations, which will be considered, for the trade waste collection service.

Eastgate Centre

Anglian Water had confirmed that they accepted liability for the Centre being charged and duly paying for water used by adjoining properties, believed to number three. A refund is to be made

Brookside Development Update

The legal documentation has been received, signed by the Chairman and duly returned. Some form of official confirmation is awaited from the Land Registry. An amended quotation in respect of fencing next to the bridge has been obtained. This is for £2.890 and was agreed by all (proposed by Mr. Phillips and seconded by Mr. Sowinski). With regard to the EV charging, it was suggested that contact should be made with other parishes to find out how the administration procedures are carried out and by which third parties. Mr. Bambridge is to speak to Mr. Paul Hewett at Breckland Council to ask if he could contact us to provide some advice.

Local Plan Update


Mr. Rayner attended two meetings at Breckland Council regarding the updating of the Local Plan. There has been a large increase in the annual target of new houses to be built in the area – from 625 to 903. Numbers have not yet been given for each parish and Breckland has requested thoughts to be expressed in what is not, at this stage, a formal consultation. Two new potential sites have come forward for North Elmham – Pump Street (6 houses, originally rejected for Highways reasons) and Blackhall Farm (8/10 houses after demolition of farm buildings). Members were requested to forward any comments to Mr. Rayner who will coordinate a response.

North Elmham Living Sustainably (NELS) Group

Mr. Fitzalan Howard is to arrange an informal meeting with the Group to discuss a way forward.

New Village Hall

A visit had been made to Swanton Morley. District Councillor, Mr. Atterwill had been very helpful and stressed the importance

of financial calculations being very accurate from the beginning. He suggested that a visit to the Marshland Hall and Tea Room could well be of benefit. Mr. Bambridge also felt that a trip to look at Lyng Village Hall would be useful.

The Future of the Churchyard

The Chairman had previously written to Rev. Sally Kimmis confirming that the Parish Council was of the opinion that conditions for closure had not been met. Mr. Bambridge had also written to Sarah Wolstenholme-Smy and Senior Management at Breckland Council.

North Elmham Football Club Facilities

A meeting had been held with the Chairman of the Football Club, Stuart Darbyshire. It was stressed that the main room of the Pavilion has to be left free of all football related items as it is used by a number of other groups, organisations and clubs

A supply agreement has been prepared by Mr. Gillespie for the purchase of the referee's hut for £1,500. The invoice is initially to be paid by the Parish Council with half of the cost (£750) being repaid by the Football Club at the rate of £75 per month. On the possible disposal of the referee's room at a future date. the Parish Council will be entitled to 50% of the sale proceeds, excluding any additional costs. A standing order of 12 monthly payments of £75 is also to be signed to cover the cost of hiring the facilities over the coming season. The arrangements detailed above were proposed by Mr. Phillips and seconded by Mr. Smith. All in favour.

Roles for Parish Council Members

Mr. Gee is to join Mr. Markwell at Prince William Wood, not as previously reported at Broom Green.

Reports from District and County Councillors

Reports submitted by the County and District Councillors can be viewed on the community website www.elmham.org.uk.

Mr. Bambridge asked if there are any parts of the village that are susceptible to flooding. The area at the bottom of Wensum Drive has experienced problems from time to time. A new type of flood bags is available, (sand bags that do not need filling), which absorb approximately 15 litres of water.

Approval of the Annual Governance and Accountability Return

The Clerk presented the financial information for the year ended 31st March, 2025. The Income and Expenditure Accounts showed income of £74,192 (£75,746), expenditure of £61,144 (£53,647) and General Fund (Bank and Building Society balances) of £191,640 (£178,592). These will be placed on the website together with the following items which will be forwarded to the External Auditors, Annual Internal Audit Report, Annual Governance Statement, Accounting Statements, Bank Reconciliation Report, Explanation of Variances Report and the Notice of Public Rights.

Any interested person has the right to inspect and make copies of the accounting records for the financial year. Initially, contact would need to be made with the Clerk.

The accounts and associated documentation were proposed for acceptance by Martin Phillips and seconded by Mr. Sowinski. All in favour.

TOWNSEND'S ELMHAM PART ONE

It was in the autumn of 1898 that Ernest Horace Townsend (1865-1947) of Pembroke College, Cambridge, moved into the fine rebrick Georgian vicarage next to the ruins at the top of the hill to become vicar of North Elmham, where he would remain for the rest of life.

The near-50 years of his incumbency covered a period of immense change across rural England which was reflected in our mid-Norfolk village. The period covered two world wars as well as technical advances and social changes that can be followed through the pages of Townsend's diaries as well as the Parish Magazine which he edited throughout the period. A more general view can be obtained from entries in the County Directories.

The first half of the 20th century was generally a period of population decline in the countryside and Elmham was no exception. It was a time when the contrasts between the living conditions in rural and urban settings was at its greatest. Dereham provided more and varied employment opportunities and housing conditions were better with running water, sanitation and gas the norm. There were many pubs, regular entertainment and from 1927 a cinema. From a population of about a thousand in 1900. Elmham had declined to 837 in 1921. Townsend feared that if this trend continued some villages would become completely deserted. This, in spite of the fact that there was employment for much of the period at the railway station where there was a bacon factory and a United Diaries depot.

Reading the county Directories the first thing that strikes one is the large number farms. The 1911 volume lists 21 farmers. Many of these would have been very small enterprises with fewer than half of these being over 150 acres and so possibly employing up to 20 men each.

Not only was this a period of population decline, but also a fall in farming prices. Farms frequently changed hands, with five farms having new tenants in 1911 while others moved away. This could also mean that farm workers living in cottages tied to these farms would also be on the move. Townend wrote in the Parish Magazine that autumn, 'The sad sight of van loads of furniture passing told of those either moving into different cottages or leaving the parish'. This pattern was only broken by a few years of higher food prices at times of wartime scarcity.

By the time of Townsend's death changes were beginning to be seen on the larger farms. New crops such as sugar beet were grown. The first tractors were appearing, although it would not be until the 1950s that they really began to replace horsepower. The first cars began to be seen on the roads and the roads themselves began to be improved and tarmacked. Bridges replaced fords with that at Worthing Mill dated 1929. A 'motor engineer' in Elmham is listed in the 1911 Directory and the newly formed Scout group took over a redundant blacksmith's shop in Eastgate Street as a headquarters in 1912. A cycle agent had opened up shop by 1925.

Social changes were also taking place. Through much of the 19th century Lord Sondes (later Earl Sondes) had been resident at Elmham Hall and was regarded as the leading member of County society. However, by the time of Townsend's arrival in the village the family fortune had fallen on hard times, and the hall was let to Mr and Mrs Wilson who took on many of the duties of the local squire, providing the parish with a reading room in the park lodge. They left after ten years in 1904 and their place was taken by Mr and Mrs Roberts who continued to run the reading room but only stayed until 1908 at which

point the Wilsons agreed to finance it again. By now it occupied a cottage on Church Hill and in 1905, 235 people were borrowing books.

It fills a very important place in the life of the village. What would the young men of the parish do without its valuable shelter, especially on winter evenings, we know not,' wrote Townsend in 1910. The hall became a Prisoner of War camp during the First World War and was left in a poor state. The Hall, plus the farms and cottages were all sold in 1919. Many of the farms were bought by their long-term tenants. The Hall was demolished and not until the site of the hall within its park, was bought by Mrs Birkbeck in 1920 was the hall rebuilt

As well as the reading room, there were other forms of entertainment available for a winter evening. A rifle club was formed in 1907 with Mr Roberts 'kindly providing a range in the loft above the stables at the Hall', and there was a lively cricket club. The Horticultural Society held a show every year. There were concerts and lectures on a wide range of subjects as well as courses provided by the County Council on such subjects as poultry keeping and fruit cultivation as well as more general further education classes for those who had achieved at least Standard 5 at school, A ladies' Working Party made clothes for the children's ward at the hospital. In 1911 scholarships were offered by the County Council, for girls to go on residential courses at the School of Cookery on St Georges Plain in Norwich, on housewifery, cooking and laundry work. Entering domestic service was still seen as an important source of employment for girls, for which they needed to be trained.

One of the first activities being encouraged through the pages of the parish magazine was the establishment of 'some form of industry which might be a source of profit and recreation during

the winter months.' The craft chosen was basketry. Miss Dyman of the Home Art and Industries Association organised a series of nine classes of two hours each for which nine people were enrolled. 'Large strong baskets for farming and gardening purposes were made' and they all sold. Withies from the water meadows near County School were harvested for use. Bushel skeps, hampers and fruit baskets continued to be made at the vicarage in 1901 and 1902, but there is no mention of them after that.

An important lifeline to many of the poorer Elmham residents which would have kept them from the workhouse was the introduction of Old Age Pensions in 1908. Those over 70 could apply for one at the Post Office. In 1911 there was a meeting to explain the working of the National Insurance Act. 'The meeting will be non-political, and it is hoped that ladies will also attend'.

Entries in the parish magazine change dramatically with the outbreak of the First World War in 1914. Not only did prayers for those in the army become a regular feature of church life, but a Red Cross Society was set up in 1914 making shirts and knitting for the troops. Belgian refugees began to arrive, and funds were raised to support them. A regular feature in the magazine was 'News of absent ones' in which sections of letters home from the front were included. Townsend noted in the magazine that the letters showed that 'rich and poor were all mixed together, and all appear to be anxious to do their bit'. A letter from a Prisoner of War was quoted in full. Thirty four Elmham men enlisted in 1914 and by the end of 1915 the number had risen to 66. Some officers and men were camped in the grounds of Elmham House and there were regular church parades. A Soldiers' evening club was set up with an average attendance of about forty of which Townsend was the Hon. Treasurer. There were games and reading matter as well

as music and a buffet. A concert in May by the West Norfolk yeomanry attracted an audience of 182. In November news came of the first casualty, George Drewey (not on the list of the fallen on the plaque in the church,) and thereafter casualties were listed. By the end of the war the number of Elmham men killed had risen to 34 (there are 38 names on the memorial plaque). There was a hospital for the wounded in Dereham and there were regular requests for eggs which always seemed to be in short supply. As Christmas approached, gifts such as tobacco and chocolates were collected to be sent to the front.

36 Elmham men who worked in protected industries such as farming and so were not called up, joined a volunteer corp. for home defence, attending regular drills and training.

The end of the war in November 1918 was celebrated with a thanksgiving service and in 1919 by a dinner in the Kings Head organised by The Demobilised Soldiers and Sailors Federation. December 1919 saw the erection of an army hut from Mattishall as a temporary memorial hall and in 1920 a memorial plaque to the fallen was unveiled in the church.

Entrance will be £5 to cover the cost of refreshments etc. children free, also a raffle will be held.





ELMHAM WILDLIFE





During the past month I've received messages from three different people telling me that they've seen Hummingbird Hawk-moths in the village. These are chunky-bodied migrant moths that feed on nectar at flowers. What sets them apart is that they are adept at gathering the nectar while still flying, hovering beside the flower and extending their long proboscis (tongue) into the flower - rather like an actual hummingbird (which they are sometimes mistaken for, but real hummingbirds don't occur outside of the Americas). In fact there are a few moths that can hover at flowers and feed in this way, but none do it in daylight as much or as well as the Hummingbird Hawk-moth. If in doubt, look out for the orangey hindwings.



I clearly don't have enough flowers in my garden as Hummingbird Hawk-moth doesn't feature among the over 1,000 species of moth I've identified here. I have seen one along the railway but too fleetingly to photograph, so in order to show you a photo I'll resort to including one from elsewhere (photo 1).



One of the people who emailed me was Rod, the same Rod who emailed me last year with a photo of a Scarlet Tiger moth that he had seen in his garden. I was rather envious then, never having seen this recent colonist, but it gave me hope that I would do so before long – after all his picture proved they were now in North Elmham. It turned out that I only had to wait a year, as I've now caught a Scarlet Tiger in my garden moth trap (photo 2).

They are magnificent moths, big, triangular, glossy black-green with bold









white and cream spots on their forewings. But in normal resting position you might wonder why they're called Scarlet Tigers. Well if it opens its wings out so you can see the hindwings, then you will see the scarlet (photo 3). It will be interesting to see how this marvellous species spreads – in some places in southern England it's gone from being non-existent to one of the commonest and easy-to-see moths. They're active in the daytime as well as the night so like Rod, you may well find one in your garden too.

Anyway, I wrote about moths last month, so I didn't want to focus on moths again this month. Instead I thought I'd talk about the Red Kite. You could make a very strong argument for saying that Red Kite is one of the most impressive British birds, and not many years ago you would have had next to no chance of seeing one in North Elmham. Formerly a widespread breeding bird their British population had shrunk to just a few pairs in central Wales. In the early 90s when I saw my first, they were very rare visitors to Norfolk, the few records undoubtedly involving Continental birds rather than wanderers from Wales.

But they were making a comeback. The Welsh population was going from strength to strength and soon spread across the border into England. Continental migrants were appearing in Norfolk more and more —I used to watch migration at Sheringham regularly and you could always rely on seeing one or two coasting west along the clifftop at some point during the early spring (photo 4). We know that Continental birds have now bred in England and so there is absolutely no doubt in my mind that the species would have recolonised most of England naturally within a few years.

But unfortunately, some people like to meddle, and thought it would be a good idea to speed things up by reintroducing them. Birds were released





first in the Chilterns and then at various other locations, and it was hailed as a huge conservation success. I'm afraid I disagree. Sure, we have ended up with a thriving population of a magnificent species that was once almost extinct, but for the initiative to have been a true conservation success then it would have had to have not happened anyway without the intervention. All we achieved is that we brought it forwards by a few years – but at considerable cost, not least in the lost opportunity of gaining valuable insights into the process of natural recolonisation.

Red Kites were never actually reintroduced in Norfolk, but the reintroduced population spread into Norfolk. In fact the very first pair that bred in Norfolk consisted of one bird from the reintroduction scheme and a second bird of Continental origin that had arrived here naturally. It took a few years before they became common across most of the county. I saw my first in North Elmham before we moved here, on the day I came to look at the house in 2014, but it was another five years before I saw another one. It was around then that a pair nested in Bintree Wood but unfortunately someone who didn't take kindly to their presence took it upon themselves to shoot the bird on the nest, completely illegally of course. Fortunately it didn't have a long-term impact on their population and Red Kites are now commonly seen in and around North Elmham.

Sadly all species raptors still face a great deal of illegal persecution from a minority of small-minded folk. Some believe that they are responsible for the loss of our songbirds, but this is far from the truth – predator populations cannot thrive if they wipe out their prey populations. Others are concerned about their impact on gamebirds, perhaps from a commercial perspective, but really this comes down to greed. If a few gamebirds are taken by birds



of prey there will be plenty left. In any case, Red Kites are the least of their problems as kites are far more likely to feed on carrion that is already dead than they are to kill something for food. The only kite I've see with what was probably live prey was one that came up from a stoop carrying a large frog in its talons – which it began to eat, or at least peck at, while still flying with it in its talons (photo 5).

Red Kites are easily recognised thanks to their long forked tail, orangey-red from above (photo 6). They are masters of flight, using their tail as a rudder twisting it as they manoeuvre while always remaining graceful and making flight look as effortless as breathing. From below they have contrasting white patches on their outer wings extending almost to the rear of the wing (photo 7). Adult Red Kites have grey heads contrasting with their reddish-toned bodies but this contrast is reduced in juveniles (photo 8).

As much as I would have been happy to wait for their natural presence here, I love watching Red Kites around the village – I even see them from my study window sometimes. I always appreciate hearing from you about the wildlife you've seen so please keep the reports coming. WENSUM VALLEY BIRDWATCHING SOCIETY

Mid-summer is usually a very quiet time for birdwatching, so WVBS went to Foxley Wood in early July to look for butterflies. A sunny day is best, and we didn't quite manage that, but it was warm and dry and there were glimpses of the sun. Luckily the butterflies didn't seem to mind, and although there were fewer individuals we found 18 different species. The big attraction at this time of year is the Purple Emperor, always seen as a challenge but it didn't disappoint. With a tip-off to

help, we searched the Oaks near the path and found one with a small area of sap running on the trunk. It had attracted Hornets and also Red Admirals, but most importantly there were also female Purple Emperors feeding on the sweet sap. My guidebook says they can become drunk on oak sap! We did also see a male or two flying high in the tops of the Oaks but had to be content with the browner females for a close view. Other spectacular butterflies are the Silverwashed Fritillaries, of which there were plenty, plus Red and White Admirals and Purple Hairstreaks. Of course we did also take note of the birds, mostly heard only, and included Bullfinch and Oystercatcher in our list.

From now on we can expect an increase in the numbers of migrant birds passing through so next month we will be back to bird watching. Here are our next meetings.

There were two women also there. They were nurses on a ship called the SS Amsterdam. They were given the opportunity to leave the ship, but they refused and stayed to help the soldiers get off safely. Very sadly they perished which is why they are also there. Their silhouettes are slightly bigger than the men.

It is called 'Standing with Giants'. The silhouettes are made from recycled signs and are part of the 80th year celebration of the end of World War II.

Dear Friends

On the 22nd of June I received the great privilege of being commissioned as on of the first group of Eco-Chaplains in the Diocese. At last, it has seen that we are part of the web of life not apart from it. We are stewards of this earth and should show more care for it.

In the New Testament Jesus tells to consider the lilies of the field and the birds of the air. I believe that he is telling us to take care of them and all creatures around us. The creation story in Genesis tells us that God at the end of each of his "days" labour looked at what he had created and saw that it was good, even after creating humankind! I sometimes wonder if he still feels the same.

We are travellers on the earth "bus" our task is to keep it healthy for those who come after us so that they can continue to enjoy the wonders of nature, the glorious creation that God has endowed to us.


