We always like to hear from people who have been interested in what we have written about the village or its neighbours, last month it was Broom Green.

First to make contact was June Clarke via e-mail who used to live opposite Nelsons at the top of the village. Now she lives in Dereham. She said how sad it was to see the Chapel in such a sorry state as she knew it long before it began to deteriorate.

Then Irene Colby (nee Frost) from Taverham wrote a letter to say when she was a young child her family lived in Monument House which faces the railway line. She said when the trains passed the whole house began shaking!

She went on to say she and her brother Michael regularly went to Sunday School at the Chapel on Sundays. As a little girl it was Sunday mornings, as she got older, it was Chapel in the afternoons and later when she was much older, she went to the Chapel on Sunday evenings because she was taking Scripture exams with Barbara Porter who also lived in Broom Green. She said they both passed!

Mrs Buxton, who lived in Broom Green took the classes and as we said last month so did Caroline's mother.

We mentioned the pub, the King William (King Billy to the locals). Irene went on to say as a family they went to the pub, you know children had to be seen and not heard. She said her father liked darts and playing whatever game was played with dice, sometimes she said she would be crying because she wanted to go home but had to stay! Poor child fancy having to stay in the pub!!

Then a phone call came from Bruce Howell who said he and his brothers also went to Sunday School at Broom Green. They lived at Blackhall Farm, as near as one can get to the railway line not far from the Council Houses alongside the Broom Green Road .He said to get there they walked along the railway line, not sure where they hopped off though .Bruce went on to say there were two sets of railway lines from County School to a short way past the bridge at Broom Green. We have said before that there was a branch line which turned right just past the bridge and continued on to Foulsham and Reepham and on to Wroxham. He said if two trains were going to leave County School station at the same time, as above, they raced each other.....what fun for youngsters to watch!

Times and lives were different then.

NORTH ELMHAM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

WEDNESDAY 5TH OCTOBER

The following information is taken from the Draft PC minutes and may be expanded where the Editors feel more explanation is necessary. The full official minutes can be viewed in the Post Office and on the Community website, once approved.

Public Participation

- a) A parishioner said that there had been a number of traffic near misses on the crossroads next to the King's Head. Proposed housing with an entrance near to the crossroads and allotments was considered to be potentially very dangerous. It was stressed that the Parish Council had already flagged this up as an issue.
- b) A parishioner again expressed disappointment with the traffic calming measures in Dereham Road. Apparently, problems are experienced with following cars when turning into the driveway. Mr. Borrett (County Councillor) was contacted about a year ago. Both the resident and Mr. Grainger will chase Mr. Borrett for an update. The view was put forward that dropping the curb would help. Another parishioner advised that a personal survey of traffic measures had been carried out which revealed that most of the traffic ignores the speed cameras. There was concern with two recent fatalities. The possibility of recommencing a Community Speed Watch scheme was mentioned. Mr. Bambridge advised that members of the public can attend SNAP meetings. This could possibly encourage the deployment of limited recording by speed cameras with traps in the village.
- c) A member of the walking football team asked if there is a possibility of a defibrillator being sited at the pavilion. Defibrillators would be discussed later in the meeting. It was also asked if the damage caused by the moles could be

repaired and if the grounds maintenance contract includes maintenance. The Parish Council utilises the services of a registered mole catcher and there is no provision for maintenance in the grounds contract which primarily involves the regular cutting of the grass. It was acknowledged that action will need to be taken to improve the playing surface. It was also asked if there were any plans to request funding in order to provide a MUGA (multi use games area) with floodlights. Mr. Fitzalan Howard stated that a recent survey of desired facilities had produced a dreadfully disappointing response rate of just 4%. Even when the exercise had been repeated in the school, with every student being given a form to take home, the response rate only increased to 10%.

Also in Attendance

Mr. K. Webb (Clerk), Mr. G. Bambridge (District Councillor) and four parishioners.

Land Management Matters

Village Green: The memorial tree has been planted. A work party, led by Messrs Gee and Smith, cleared the ditch. Some vandalism has occurred with rails kicked out and planks broken. The possibility of CCTV cameras on the Eastgate Centre is to be discussed at the next meeting. NGF Ltd is to visit to carry out identified repairs needed to some of the play equipment.

Cathedral Ruins: Mrs. Keeble reported that English Heritage had agreed to increase management fee by 5% which produces a new annual figure of £5,355. Depending on circumstances, there is a possibility that a further increase can be negotiated during the forthcoming term of five years.

Cathedral Meadows: Mr. Fitzalan Howard reported that, following discussions with Brown and Co, the stewardship scheme is to be renewed. A decision will need to be made in the Spring as to what type of scheme is to be used. It is felt that rewilding would not be the preferred option.

Millennium Wood (and Jubilee Wood): The new bench is in place.

Bridleway on Disused Railway Line and Other Railway Linked Matters:

Mr. Rayner said that a padlock had been cut off a chain on one of the gates. The matter had been reported and the padlock was duly replaced.

Prince William Wood: A tree trunk had fallen on the fence. Mr. Markwell dealt with this. There are currently five dead ash trees with another appearing in a poor condition. They do not appear to be likely to fall over and it was agreed to leave them for now.

Allotments

Mr. Phillips said that rents would be collected on 11th October. There are currently two inactive plots. Two taps are to be examined for possible leaks. The hedges have been cut.

Street Lights

Highway Matters

Mr. Grainger reported that the blocked drain near the Post Office, which had been clogged up with weeds, and the drain on Church Hill, had both been cleared. Mr. Smith said that the Orchard Close drains need to be examined and he will provide images and precise locations.

In response to the enquiry about utilising the Parish Partnership Scheme to part finance a pedestrian crossing near the bus stop and pavilion, Norfolk County Council advised that such schemes are not within the scope of the Parish Partnership Scheme, (although the documentation previously issued to Parish Councils

seemed to indicate that they were), and management of these is carried out on a risk assessment basis. The typical cost of design and installation is in the region of £90,000 plus annual maintenance fees. Currently, there are no funds available and a waiting list of five other schemes is in place. It was agreed by all to defer the matter to a later date (proposed by Mr. Grainger and seconded by Mr. Fitzalan Howard). Mr. Gee has cleared the overgrown 30mph sign. The Pump Street pavement has been covered by vegetation and is practically impossible to use. Mr. Grainger will report to the County Council with a view to them clearing it.

Pavilion and Playing Field

The new larger bin is in place. The Football Club, on occasions, requires the grass to be cut in order that a suitable surface is provided for matches. Chris Reeve (Chairman of the Football Club) will liaise with CGM. It is disappointing that, despite promises and regular chasing by the Clerk, CGM have still not produced a credit note in respect of work that was not carried out earlier in the year. The basketball hoop is in place. Trees at the top of the field are causing damage to the wall. Mr. Fitzalan Howard is to obtain quotations in respect of the work that needs to be done.

Youth Club Facilities

Mr. Grainger has spoken to Gabriel Mansbridge who has been appointed as Active Norfolk Youth Co-ordinator for the area. Assistance has been received from Mr. Bambridge who was thanked for his help in this matter.

Eastgate Centre

A broken window has been repaired and the insurance policy has been updated.

Brookside Development Update

Mr. Rayner is to check the S106 agreement with regard to the provision of car parking, in particular the link with the number of houses built and/or occupied as to when it is to be made available.

Defibrillators

EAAA is offering free training courses. Seven people wish to attend (including four P.C. members). The Chairman will contact all to establish a suitable date which will be given to EAAA. A note is to be placed in Elmham News to give others the opportunity to be trained.

Groups (Walking Football and Tennis Club) have requested that a defibrillator be sited at the pavilion. The Chairman has contacted The Community Heartbeat Trust and the cost will be in the region of £2K (initial quotation of £1,855 received). The Tennis Club is prepared to contribute to this cost. All agreed to proceed with this purchase. Proposed by Miss Ferris and seconded by Mr. Smith. Mr. Bambridge mentioned that a new First Responders group has just been established covering Foxley and Longham.

Local Green Space Designations by Breckland District Council

This document has been published by Breckland Council with a public consultation to follow.

Call for Sites - Breckland Council

The document has been published with the sites put forward as potential locations for development. They have to be assessed and then are put out for consultation. It is a lengthy process. Six sites have been nominated in North Elmham involving, in total, 110 houses. The Local Plan states a current need of 14 houses but this will be reassessed. A new garden village of 5,000 houses (Norfolk Railway Village) has been put forward for Billingford. It is the same area which was nominated in 2018 and has been submitted by a company called Black Box Planning.

Norfolk Social Infrastructure Fund

Please refer to item on Pavilion Funding.

Report from District and/or County Councillors

Mr. Bambridge reported that a number of District Councils are getting together

to discuss what can be done regarding the nutrient neutrality rules, which will seriously hinder the building of houses, imposed by Natural England. Any comments/views regarding the possible exception site should be made by parishioners.

Replacement Street Lights

Mr. Markwell said that the costs of two new lights would be Pump Street - £1,400 and Eastgate Street - £1,000. All agreed that these should be reinstated and Westcotec has been asked to proceed.

Pavilion Funding

Mr. Grainger had submitted a notice of interest in obtaining grant funding for the pavilion which would also benefit the Football Club. The Social Infrastructure Fund, run by Norfolk County Council, has £775K available. A desire for a 40% increase in the size of the building, together with a number of other items, has been expressed. A grant of £60K has been requested with a total spend of £75K. The Parish Council and Football Club would, between them, contribute the sum of £15K

Road Safety Measures

It was stressed that, over a period of a considerable number of years, road safety has always been of the highest priority for the Parish Council. A considerable sum of money has been spent on a range of measures which has undoubtedly resulted in significant improvement. However, it is acknowledged that new initiatives must be explored and, in this respect, ramps and speed reduction pillows have been mentioned. These can be seen in places such as Old Costessey and near Downham Market. It appears that they are quite successful in reducing traffic speeds. Mr. Grainger is to research after the result of the enquiry into the recent fatal accident is known.

External Auditor Appointing Arrangements

The current national contract with the existing external auditors, PKF Littlejohn, expires this year and the next 5-year appointing period runs from 2022-23 to 2026-27. During the previous 5-year period, all smaller authorities were "opted-in" to the central procurement regime managed by Smaller Authorities' Audit Appointments (SAAA). No authority elected to "opt-out". The various procedures required under statute to appoint your own external auditor are complex, onerous and potentially expensive. Mr. Phillips proposed that the current "opting-in" position be retained and this was seconded by Mr. Grainger. All members were in favour.

The Hedgehog Highway Project

The Parish Council has been invited to participate in the Hedgehogs R Us Highway Project. This involves hedgehog conservation with gaps being made in fences to allow for foraging and mating. A highway surround raises awareness to their plight and encourages others to take part. A box of 50 highway surrounds and 50 information leaflets costs £150. It was agreed by all not to participate in the scheme at this stage.

Several ideas came forward and were noted and hopefully will be in the schedule for next year and also different media ways for promoting the show.

Recently the club was given the North Elmham Horticultural Society minute books dated from 1923 to 1954 from which small, interesting excerpts were read to members including this:

18th March 1923: A sports committee be formed alongside the general committee to arrange Galloway, Trotting and Hurdle Race's and that 80 posts 4'6" with band at the top also a hole for rope be purchased at the rate of 1/9p each. Also Brisley Band be engaged for the night dances at the flower show (11 performers £3.00) and a marquee be hired from a Mr Yull of Dereham for £7-10-0.

3rd March 1933: The Flower Show shall be open to all residents living within a radius of 5 miles of the show ground and the horticultural section be divided into two classes:

- 1. Subscribers Class A open to those who employ gardeners (!)
 - Class B open to those who do not employ gardeners.
- 2. Cottage Class open to agricultural labourers and those in a similar station

18th August 1936: That permission to hold a gymkhana and fair on the park. It was decided the Watts Naval School be asked to give their display and the RAC or AA to take charge of the car park and the following prices of admission should

be charged entrance 6d, children 2d, car park 6d, bicycles 2d.dance 1/-

Just a few of the notes from the minute book which about 19 committee members organized the flower show, sports day and gymkhana and in the first instance was the Horticultural society.

All I can say is well done to those members. It would have taken a great deal of work to organise such a show.

There was some amusement at the division of classes but of course it was a very rural area; how times have changed.

The evening finished with a very popular item; members planting up a pot of different spring bulbs and viola plants.

A big thank you to Heather for organizing the pots, buying compost, bulbs and plants and everyone will be looking forward to the spring to see the results.

The Flower of the Month was won by Jo with a beautiful vibrant magenta Persicaria.

WIVES PLUS ALL

November's evening meeting was in the Memorial Hall, North Elmham on Thursday 10th and we were given a very interesting talk by Jerry Woodley from West Runton who has been a Coastguard for nearly 40 years, in fact he has finally bowed out after 14,000 days on call. Jerry retired at the beginning of this year.

During his career Jerry was the most experienced cliff rescue technician in North Norfolk and the Station Officer at Sheringham for about 10 years. He received a Chief Coastquard's Commendation for a cliff rescue he carried out in a snowstorm at Mundesley about 20 years ago. He said that he didn't think there was a breed of dog he hadn't recovered from a cliff, and he has attended every kind of coastal incident you can think of. There have been plane and helicopter crashes, emergencies on crab boats, yachts and inflatables, people stuck on cliffs, out at sea, under rocks and in the marshes. Jerry remarked to us that when you're out on the marsh in the middle of the night in winter you might ask yourself "why am I doing this" but he said you have to think that the person you are looking for is someone's loved one.

Jerry also said that there had been tragedies but there have been good times. He holds the record for the oldest rescue of an 84 year old man and the youngest of a two year old and he said the biggest incidents stuck in your mind and among the most tragic was finding the bodies of a 6 year old boy along with his 4 year old sister who were washed up on the shore in the Sheringham area after they had gone missing from Holme Beach in 1996. He said his own sons were then aged three and five and the tragedy had really hit home. He told of another memorable incident when in 2019 at Sheringham a man was trapped by his leg by two boulders as the waves crashed around his neck. Sheringham Coastquards were

the first on the scene and they had to think quickly on their feet as the man was drowning in front of them and his fellow Coastguards had to hold his head above water and Jerry called in everyone who was needed, including a surgical team from Cambridge as there were fears because of the time he had been trapped his leg may have to have been removed. However, thankfully to everyone's relief, he was suddenly released from his ordeal



The North Elmham Parish Council have agreed to support the establishment of a new group to monitor the speed of traffic within the village.

The establishment of such a group will act as a deterrent and hopefully make our village safer. It is also more likely that we will benefit from ad hoc mobile speed camera visits.

When he wasn't in his Coastguard role Jerry worked also as a self employed builder and often after spending the night on the cliffs then went to work as usual and he continues this today. He has recently also retired from 25 years as a rugby union referee. He also enjoys mountain biking and he said he'll always be keeping one eye seaward as with any Coastguard, you never really retire. Jerry's talk was so interesting I'm sure we could have listened to him all evening, but we had to reluctantly say goodnight and we thank him for his talk.

NORTH ELMHAM WILDLIFE

Autumn is the time of year when usually my focus starts to move away from insects (there are fewer flying at this time of year) and more to bigger things like birds. It's migration season, when wintering birds arrive in the country and if you're lucky you have a chance of seeing unusual passage migrants moving through on their way south. But this year has been different. I've recently signed a new contract to survey insects – the first time I've done this in a professional capacity – and that alongside my other commitments has left me with less time to look around the parish for birds.

One migrant bird I have seen a few times during the last month is the Redpoll. Redpolls look different in different places - the Lesser Redpoll that breeds in the UK is smaller and darker than the Mealy Redpoll that breeds in Scandinavia and sometimes winters in the UK, and that is smaller and darker than the Arctic Redpoll, usually a rare visitor to the UK though some winters they arrive in numbers. But there is a lot of overlap and identifying them is often difficult and controversial. Taxonomists (those concerned with classifying life and deciding what is, and what isn't, a different species) can't agree on them, with some thinking there are as many six or seven different species and others arguing that they should all be lumped together as one. The ones I've seen well enough to identify this month have all been Lesser Redpolls (photo 1), likely to have migrated here from further north in the UK or the near Continent, but a few pairs breed in Norfolk so they may not have travelled very far at all.

Even birds that you can see all year are often partial migrants – that is, part of their population migrates. So for example you can see Blackbirds and Robins here all year round, but lots more arrive in the

winter that have bred on the Continent. and while some of our breeding birds may remain all year others move south for the winter. Relatively few species undergo no migration at all - some of our gamebirds, some of our owls, Green Woodpecker and Mute Swan being just about the only ones you're likely to see around North Elmham. As I walk round the parish and meet people they often see that I'm interested in wildlife and tell me about the wildlife they've encountered (thanks, by the way!). The bird they mention most often is the Mute Swan - I suppose that's not surprising given that they're big and white so easy to see and recognise. I must admit I get a bit blasé about them – they don't have interesting migratory habits and they're no challenge to identify (I like a challenge). But I should learn to appreciate them more – they're remarkable creatures in many ways. I was struck the other day as I watched a pair fly over my head, the sunlight shining through their flight feathers so that they lit up against the blue sky (photo 2).

Another bird we can see all year is the Kestrel (photo 3), but some of these migrate so we aren't necessarily seeing the same ones all the time. It's very possible that some of the birds we see here in winter have hatched in another country. Wherever they come from, there aren't as many Kestrels around as there used to be. As usual a range of factors are playing a part – among them a decline in prey, use of pesticides, feeding habitat being 'tidied up' (they often hunt along road verges) and nesting habitat being destroyed (old buildings like disused barns, now often converted for other uses).

It's not just birds that migrate – lots of flying insects do too. I've mentioned some migratory moths the last couple of months and it has continued to be one of the best autumns ever from moth migration. The unseasonal mild weather

has resulted from a southerly airflow from Iberia bringing not just warm air but also migratory moths. This month I've caught two Scarce Bordered Straws, a Gem (the first time I've ever caught one, but it was a very worn tatty specimen), a handful of Rush Veneers, Silver Ys, Rustydot Pearls (photo 4) and quite a lot of Diamond-backs. Diamond-backs are tiny moths (not much more than a centimetre long) with antennae pointing forwards and a variable uneven pale line down their back, the widest bits supposedly being diamond-shaped (photo 5). These undertake huge migrations - not just from the south but some coming from a long way east too. Given the recent winds the chances are the ones we're seeing at the moment have come from Africa, but at other times they are thought to arrive here from Asia – extraordinary journeys for such a tiny insect.

One non-migratory moth that's having a good year is the Streak. Most years I'm lucky to catch one or two; last year I caught eight which I thought was exceptional but so far this year I've caught 41 and they're still going strong. Most insect populations fluctuate with peaks and troughs every four or five years so I expect this will prove to be a higherthan-usual peak rather than an upward trend, but time will tell. The long white streak through their forewings gives them their name but the wings are covered in a complex pattern of white, warm reddish brown and blackish lines and patches on a dark brown background (photo 6).

I don't often write about caddisflies, mostly because they're not among the most attractive insects to look at and most of them don't have English common names. But although the adults might not be much to look at, the larvae are fascinating. Living under water they create for themselves a case that they spin using silk secreted from their mouthparts

and incorporate leaves, twigs, and even sand granules or tiny stones, making them blend in perfectly with the background so that they are less vulnerable to predators. As I tend to stay on land, I never see this, but I do catch the adult insects in my moth trap regularly. One I caught recently was a new species for me and is rarely found in the Wensum Valley — a faintly-speckled but otherwise plain brown species with only a scientific name, Limnephilus politus (photo 7).

Some moth enthusiasts only look at the moths in their moth trap, but I find the "by-catch" – all the other insects that are attracted to light – just as interesting. Among the beetles this month was this lovely Orange Ladybird (photo 8), not a rare species but one I usually see more often in the summer months.

Update on Affordable Housing Scheme

It has been reported that Broadland Housing is experiencing some difficulties of a financial nature and may possibly not be delivering as many houses as previously planned. Mr. Rayner is to make contact with them with a view to establishing the current situation.

Police Visit and Update

Land Management Matters

Village Green: Two grass areas, including the triangular one near the gate, have not been cut. The possibility of CCTV cameras on the Eastgate Centre is to be discussed at the next meeting.

Cathedral Ruins: Mrs. Keeble reported that the slopes have been cut again by the remotely controlled mower. The tower has

railings around it with a warning of falling masonry. The present situation has been queried but no response, as yet, has been forthcoming.

Cathedral Meadows: Mr. Fitzalan Howard had forwarded a report as follows:

- (i) small signs have been ordered and will be fixed on the seven external gates requesting dogs to be kept on leads when sheep are in the field.
- (ii) An estimate for fencing had been received (£1,820). It was generally felt that another should be obtained.
- (iii) A quotation is awaited in respect of the removal of one overhanging ash branch near the lane behind Jubilee Wood.

Allotments

Mr. Phillips said that all rents, except one, had been collected. Work on the water supply is to be done.

Highway Matters

Highways have advised that the current condition of the Pump Street pavement does not meet their intervention criteria but they will monitor.

The query from a parishioner regarding the pinch point in Holt Road and the private property access had been referred to the Highways Engineer, Matt Lines, who advised that his predecessor, Matt Wording, had spoken to the parishioner on a site visit before he retired. The parishioner was informed that an extension to the dropped kerb could be applied for but the expense involved would need to be covered by the parishioner. He felt that there was not an issue when he entered the driveway in his larger car.

New batteries which are four and seven years old have been ordered for the SAM devices.

The cost of these will be just over £500. The drains in Orchard Close are now in a satisfactory state.

Pavilion and Playing Field

Mr. Smith stated that the lighting in the pavilion needs to be replaced. Extra floodlighting is also required outside as well as a new light on the end of the building. Quotations are to be obtained with the intention being to purchase LED lights.

Youth Club Facilities

Brookside Development Update

Mr. Rayner had checked the S106 agreement with regard to the provision of car parking. The car park has to be laid out before 50% of the properties are occupied and then transferred to the Parish Council before 80% are occupied.

Defibrillators

A piece has been placed in Elmham News regarding EAAA free training courses. Contact by anyone wishing to be involved in the training has to be made by 20th November.

Call for Sites - Breckland Council

Mr. Rayner felt that any pre-assessment of sites would probably take place after the period of consultation for which there is no firm date. Breckland Council is unclear regarding the present situation and it is felt that the consultation will be commenced in the New Year. It has been noted that there are apparent discrepancies in respect of a piece of land, near the Worthing Road, which is on the boundary of Billingford and North Elmham. It seems that Breckland have not checked in which village the land is actually situated.

Pavilion Funding

The bid to obtain grant funding for the pavilion through the Social Infrastructure

Fund, run by Norfolk County Council, was unsuccessful. Suggestions were made to approach the Norfolk Community Foundation and various offshore windfarm companies. It was agreed by all that if the question was posed, the Parish Council would be prepared to commit £20K for the right project.

Police Community Resolution for Criminal Damage Incident

The meeting with the young person responsible for this crime and his parent had taken place. One job had been carried out so far which involved removing weeds from the pavement in front of the Institute. This lasted for one and a half hours. As the next phase, Mr. Gee is to receive assistance in cleaning out ditches.

Annual Budget

Mr. Phillips produced a draft budget for 2023/2024 which had been circulated to members in advance of the meeting. It is anticipated that the tax base may well be slightly higher than the figure for the current year. Projected income is £57,526 with expenditure of £60,924. It is the intention for the Band D contribution to remain at £80.24 with this being formally approved at the next meeting by which time the relevant information should have been received from Breckland Council. Another heading in the accounts will be required for the Brookside development.

THE RAILWAY FOOTPATH

I first wrote about the railway line footpath in the March 2021 issue of Elmham News in which I explained the recent history of the line and the path. This path runs alongside the railway track from the buffers near the station northwards to the Yarrow Crossing. With that article I included a photograph of a sign erected by the railway company claiming the path to be a "Permissive Path". This description is a very precise legal term which tells you that the public only have the right to walk along the route with the permission of the owner, which in this case is the railway company. Under that description, the owner can close the path permanently or temporarily at any time and without due notice.

The railway company, to its great credit, has significantly improved the path in

the intervening period by making it safer and by installing two seats in attractive locations which provide good views across the river marches. Nevertheless, since the article appeared the railway company has erected more colourful and explicit signs which repeat the claim that the path is only a permissive one.

The background to all of this is as set out in the March 2021 article. The negotiations of the sale of the railway line from Breckland to the railway company

included the following crucial requirement which was incorporated into the sale documents in 2003. Under this the company was required to:

"at all times permit the public to pass and repass ... over and along the property by such route ... as shall be approved in writing by the Transferor" (ie the Breckland Council).

There was nothing to say where the footpath had to run, and that was left to be settled in further discussions and to be covered by a written agreement with Breckland. The key requirement was that the line was to remain a footpath for public use, although it was never formally designated a Public Footpath pending these joint decisions about the exact route. It is important to understand that the purchase price for the whole line was reduced by the amount the District Valuer calculated it would cost the railway company to install the path. Since then, I don't believe that there has ever been a formal agreement to settle the route.

So, the route of the path remains to be defined, especially in the station area where there is now a planning permission for a miniature railway, but that planning consent is covered by planning legislation, and it does not impact on the need for a route for the whole path to be formally agreed.

The footpath is an important community resource, and I would urge the Parish Council, Breckland Council and the railway company to settle this issue, and to submit the route to the County Council to have it formally designated as a Public Footpath and for the route to be entered into the Definitive Map of county public footpaths.

THE RAILWAY VILLAGE AND THE RIVER WENSUM

If you have been keeping an eye on the Wensum in recent years, and in particular during this long dry summer, when water levels were particularly low, you will have seen the effects of the pollution from nutrients, high levels of phosphates and nitrates in the watercourse. Algae growth smothering the river plant life, and many fish dying as a result. This has mainly been caused by agricultural practices, and poor sewage treatments leaching into the ground and surface waters.

In March 2022 Natural England was so concerned about the deterioration of the water quality in the Wensum, that they wrote to Breckland Council, about their concerns, and advised that Breckland should take steps to achieve Nutrient Neutrality in the Wensum, and the adjoining catchment area.

The Conservation of Habitats Regulations 2017 "requires local planning authorities to ensure new development does not cause adverse impacts". Breckland's response has been to end giving planning permission for new houses, "or any other developments comprising overnight accommodation" in the Wensum catchment "while the Council assesses the implications of these matters" For further information search Breckland Council Planning and Building Control Nutrient Neutrality.

Making significant improvement to the water quality, and habitats in the Wensum Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) and Special Area of Conservation(SAC) is going to take quite some time, and there is much work to be done to prevent further deterioration, let alone improvements.

It is not all bad news, there is quite a lot of commitment and energy going into

improving biodiversity of the river, and the adjacent riverside regions.

The Upper Wensum Cluster Farm Group, www.wensumfarmers.co.uk (together with partners such as UEA, Norfolk Rivers Trust etc.), is doing some serious work in improving habitat, and preventing run off of pollutants. They are 29 farmers, covering 10,000 Hectares in the upper Wensum valley catchment. They are, "committed to improving water quality in the River Wensum catchment, and enhancing the surrounding habitat mosaic, for us, and future generations" Check out their website, the map of which farms are in the "cluster" their video, and projects, are all worth a look.

I would like to thank the Elmham News for the article last month about the return of "Railway Village" which would, if approved, link up the villages of North Elmham Billingford, and Bintree, turning it into a small town.

Although Breckland Council is simply putting out a "call for sites" at this stage in the planning process, it is clear that it would be irresponsible, and quite possibly not legal, for Breckland Council to seriously consider this particular proposal for a large scale housing development. This is because of the location, right next to the river Wensum SSSI and SAC.

The present sewage works, for Bintree, (and the proposed "Railway Village) is situated at the end of the Green Lane from Billingford, just past High House Farm and Bintree Wood, and down to the edge of the valley, only about 250 metres from the River Wensum. If permission was given for a large development of 500 new houses, they would be discharging effluent very close to the river.

If this was allowed to happen, the work of the Wensum Farmers Cluster Group to reduce nitrate and phosphate pollution

upstream of the sewage works, might seem rather pointless, if the river became even more polluted downstream.

There are many reasons why the "Railway Village" proposal should not even be considered, the effect on the Wensum is only one, but one that is very important.

We are fortunate to have such a beautiful place to live, and such a rare and important natural resource on our doorstep. It is bad news that the river has already lost some of its life, due to pollution, it needs our protection to prevent it from losing more.

WENSUM VALLEY BIRDWATCHING SOCIETY

The club's autumn activities included two excellent group outings, to Frampton Marsh RSPB and to the North Norfolk coast. Frampton is a bit further than we usually travel but it is such a good reserve that we do visit it every year or so. This time was no exception, getting off to an excellent start with several Yellow Wagtails in the field of cattle next to the car park. On the walk towards the sea wall, besides the usual collection of finches and waders, including Snipe, Black-tailed Godwits and Dunlin, we were thrilled to see a group of seven Red-breasted Geese. We were not certain if these were truly wild birds or if they were feral, but it was great to get a good view of them. And the same could be said of the Water Rail preening in the sun (the view that is).

The walk around the hides produced other stars such as a Little Stint and two Curlew Sandpipers, but the undoubted standout bird of the day was a Nightjar, spotted on the Grassland Trail after lunch by Emily. It was sitting by the side of the path in full view just a few yards in front of us. We could hardly believe our eyes, as such a sighting in daylight is very unusual. It was the first such report for the reserve.

The North Norfolk visit focussed on the Wells area, starting at the beach car park. They explored the woods, finding Redwings, Great Spotted Woodpecker, Linnets and the usual tit flocks, and then the sea from the lifeboat slipway. Here Red-breasted Merganser, Razorbill and Gannet were the main attractions, but all enjoyed the diving Cormorants as well. After a lunch stop that made use of the café in the car park, they moved on to North Point Pools, which gave a great opportunity to see three types of Pipit together - Water, Rock and Meadow. A really useful chance to compare three hard to identify species. Also seen were Black-tailed Godwits, Lapwing, Ruff, Spotted Redshank and a flock of 30 Curlews. Ending the day on the saltmarsh the group were treated to views of a male Hen Harrier hunting over the marsh. A total of 73 species were seen on an enjoyable day.

Indoors we have enjoyed a talk on Wheatfen by the warden, Will Smith, some great tips on birding from Su Gough, and the AGM in November with a talk by member Alan Hale. More details of all of these, as well as information on future events, can be found on the website – WVBS.co.uk. Brief details of future meetings are given below.






