NORTH ELMHAM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

WEDNESDAY 6TH DECEMBER 2023

The following information is taken from the Draft PC minutes and may be expanded where the Editors feel more explanation is necessary. The full official minutes can be viewed in the Post Office and on the Community website, once approved.

Councillors Present Were: Mrs. J. Borgnis (Chairman), Mr. M. Phillips, Miss A. Ferris, Mr. T. Fitzalan Howard, Mr. B. Gee, Mr. P. Grainger, Mrs. A. Keeble, Mr. J. Labouchere, Mr. N. Markwell, Mr. M. Rayner and Mr. C.Smith.

Also in Attendance: Mr. K. Webb (Clerk), Mr. G. Bambridge (District Councillor) and one parishioner.

Public Participation

A parishioner informed members of the details regarding a recently submitted planning application to Breckland Council and the business intentions associated with it.

Updated Information and Matters Arising

Land Management Matters

Village Green: The line of trees to be cut is close to the Conservation Area. Therefore, it is felt appropriate for permission to be requested for the work to be done. Mr. Crisp will attend to this matter. A new oak tree is to be planted to replace the tree that has died. It will be positioned approximately ten feet from the position of the original.

Cathedral Ruins: The Chairman is to write to the parishioner regarding the hole in the wall.

Millennium Wood (and Jubilee Wood):

The thinning needed in Jubilee Wood is to be done in January. A tree has fallen but

is propped up. It is to be removed in the near future.

Prince William Wood: Many of the trees (oak, ash and cherry) were planted more than 30 years ago. A quotation for the work to be done has been obtained from Mr. Crisp and duly accepted.

Church Meadow: Work has been continued on the ditch.

Allotments

Mr. Phillips reported that three of the remaining plots have been taken and the fourth will be available in the Spring.

Street Lights

The faulty Eastgate Centre light which was sent away for repair has not yet been returned. There has been no progress with the light at 29 Eastgate Street (Westcotec is being chased).

The resident in Holt Road who needs to have his wall rendered will have to engage an electrician to attend, at his own cost.

Highway Matters

Mr. Grainger reported that the Connect 21 bus on Holt Road is stopping just after Spencers Close. This is considered as a potentially dangerous spot and attempts will be made to contact the bus company to identify a more suitable place. Matt Lines and Linda McDermott (Norfolk County Council) continue to investigate the new temporary bus stop on the side of the road near County School.

Pavilion and Playing Field

It is understood that the Walking Football Club has relocated to Swanton Morley. Questions continue to be asked regarding the Parish Council's booking policy with all comments received being fully considered. Members were unanimous in strongly agreeing, after lengthy contemplation, that no changes were required. As such, the policy will not be altered.

Eastgate Centre

Lighting and CCTV cameras have been installed.

Call for Sites Update

Breckland Council considers the proposal for the curiously named "Railway Village" as inappropriate due to the number of houses, i.e. the entire need of the District would be more than covered by this one development. They make no mention of the infrastructure and environmental issues.

Mr. Bambridge is to attend a meeting in mid-December at which a briefing will be given. A new consultation commences on 14th December and will last for a period of about eight weeks until the end of February. There are four proposed options under the Local Plan and the initial reaction is that the preferred option is Scenario A which concentrates development in the Market towns with 80% of housing need being allocated to the five Market Towns and 20% to the Local Service Centres, resulting in 53 houses for North Elmham.

Christmas Lights

The bigger tree has arrived.

Report from District and/or County Councillors

Mr. Bambridge reported that the old Swanton Morley airbase is on the list for possible development.

A significant improvement in roads would be required if this was to be considered. A SNAP meeting has recently been attended with North Elmham being an item on the agenda.

Police continue to keep a watchful eye on the village following the increase in vandalism and anti-social behaviour. A conference in London discussing flooding issues has been attended and any problems with local flooding should be reported to NSFA (Norfolk Strategic Flood Alliance). Interestingly, Italy has recently devolved certain powers to Regional Governments and this has apparently improved matters considerably in that country.


Annual Budget

Mr. Phillips produced the final draft of income and expenditure figures for the 2024/2025 year. This showed anticipated income of £60,924 and expenditure of £60,127. The tax base has increased slightly – from 502.6 to 503.9 – and it was agreed to leave the Band D contribution at £80.64. This will give a Precept of £40,635.

All members agreed to the above figures.

CGM Group and Grounds Maintenance For 2024

The contract runs from the beginning of March to the end of October. The only adjustment required will be the need to increase the cuts of the main field (playing field) from 15 to 17. CGM will be requested to quote and Norse will again be chased to establish whether they would be interested in tendering for the work.



Pavilion Car Park: Road Sweeper Parking

The Chairman has spoken to the person involved and the vehicle has been moved. An offer has been made to sweep the village and car park once a month as a gesture of goodwill in exchange for continued use of the car park. This matter was carefully considered but it was felt that the facility should not be used for commercial vehicles and, as such, the offer would have to be declined.

North Elmham Living Sustainably (NELS) Group

This is considered by all members to be a good initiative which, in principle, is supported. It was mentioned that, in the fullness of time, the community land at Boars Hill may prove to be useful for this project. The Chairman is to talk to the Group leader.

OUR ELMHAM

If you have recently moved to Elmham, you probably looked carefully at what the village has to offer. We who are involved with the News have lived here for years and know the comings and goings of village life.

We know Elmham is one of the larger villages in the county – with a long and interesting history behind it, being mentioned in the Doomesday Book. Sometimes we wish we could go back and be a fly on the walls of the village pubs– how we would love to hear the banter. Would we understand the way of talking, bearing in mind the locals had strong local accents and used different language to today's speech.

So, we decided to take a look at our village with fresh eyes. If we were looking for somewhere different to live and had a young family, we would know we needed a school nearby – and a surgery, which dispenses your prescriptions! Elmham has a lot more to offer.

We have a well stocked shop with newspapers too, a Post Office which also has a brilliant café, two public houses, and a fish and chip shop. Over the railway line is a garage, always on hand for help and advice. There is also a vehicle repair centre close by.

The village is well served with different bus routes coming through, so if you

don't have a car you don't always have to rely on taxis or friends!

The Memorial Hall has a large hall which was a memorial to the fallen from the two world wars and another smaller hall which in the past was the Methodist Chapel, both are available to hire. There used to be a Congregational Chapel too, that is now a family home.

We have a large playing field with a football pitch, a pavilion and a basket ball area. The popular tennis club meet and use tennis court which has floodlights. There are two bowls greens, one at the King's Head and one next to the tennis courts. As well as this green space, Elmham has the Diamond Jubilee Green in the centre of the village complete with play equipment for the younger ones and trees and benches, to take your ease on. Years ago, we had the railway line through the village going to Norwich one way and Wells next the Sea, the other way. That too is ideal for walking.

Then on the top of the hill keeping an eye on us, stands St Mary's church, still standing proudly after 900 years.

Next to the church are the Chapel Ruins, a small Norman chapel, which was converted into a small castle whose defensive banks and moats still surround the site. Behind the ruins you can walk around several parish owned large fields called the Cathedral Meadows where dogs are allowed and there are some wonderful views across the Wensum valley and plenty of wildlife to see.

Behind the church we have Millennium Wood, a fenced-in haven for dog walkers and off Back Lane not far from the old railway station is another wood, Prince William Wood which can be accessed from the main road and through Orchard Close.

All in all, we think we think we are lucky to live here and hope that you will feel that way too.

SCHOOL NEWS

Sheep class have been so busy since returning for 2024! We had a little move around during the Christmas break and our children love our new layout - our loose parts area is even bigger, we have more creative areas and even added more investigative areas!

We started our new History unit, learning about aeroplanes. We will learn about the

first flight and the Wright Brothers over the next few weeks.

The children have already created beautiful prints in their art sketchbooks. We are amazed at their creativity!

In PE, the children have dazzled us with their incredible dance moves, using different movements to form standing and floor shapes. We have started to work alongside a partner, creating short routines.

We continue to use our indoor and outdoor provision, as well as our dedicated Welly Day area. We love observing the changes each day, particularly the ice that has formed in our water tray and large tyres!

Whales class have jumped straight back into their learning after the Christmas break. We are studying the destruction of Pompeii by Mount Vesuvius in history and are discovering how we can use archaeological evidence to draw conclusions about the past. We have also begun reading 'Escape from Pompeii' in English, and by half term we will have written our own exciting disaster stories! Alongside this, in geography we are learning about the volcanoes of Europe especially current given the recent volcanic activity in Italy and Iceland! We are also lucky this term to have a teacher come from the County Music Service to teach Whales how to play the ukulele such fun!

Last term in Lions class the children made a moving toy using cams. Firstly, the children learned about types of cam and types of movement. Then they designed their toy before making the frame. Measuring, sawing and securing with glue were some of the skills that they employed, and the finished articles looked wonderful. This term we are listening to the story The Golden Horsemen, a story set in the Golden Age of Islam, an era of great discovery and invention in the city of Baghdad. The story has captured their interest and the children will be writing their own stories set in that historical age.

FOOD POVERTY IN ELMHAM

We have all heard about food poverty on the news. We are told that 2 million people in Britain are in need of support in providing food for themselves and their families.

Perhaps we think that this is a problem that exists somewhere else in more deprived parts of the country and solving it can be left to the big food bank charities, but this is not necessarily the case. How do you get from Elmham to the nearest food banks in Dereham and Fakenham if you do not have a car or can't afford the bus fare? The food bank is particularly important for those without their own transport.

Figures collected by Breckland Council show that average earnings are well below the national average. Breckland is 320th out of 346 local authorities in terms of the percent of jobs paying less than the living wage. The need for help in our community is as great as anywhere else.

This is why the Church Larder is so important, but without continued support from the more fortunate members of the community it will soon run out of money. It relies on donations of food left in the church as well as funds in a church community account which derived its money from a percentage of the takings at events such as the Garden Fete.

NEW BRECKLAND LOCAL PLAN CONSULTATION

Breckland Council have a new consultation running at present, which closes on 19th February. Therefore, the Parish Council urges residents to submit their comments before that date. As most of you will know, the ugly prospect of the New Town has been deemed to be inappropriate by Breckland, at least for this current Local Plan review. However, this still leaves the difficult issue of other new housing for the District, particularly where it should be located.

This new consultation asks for views on various topics, with the most important and relevant for North Elmham being 'alternative development strategy options', and 'further measures to protect Breckland's countryside'/'towns, villages, countryside'. To view details of these and the other two topics go to Breckland's website where you'll be directed to the 'Commonplace' consultation pages. Alternatively, you could go to an information stall in Dereham Marketplace from 10am–1pm on Tuesday, 6th February.

Given the timing of the consultation, the Parish Council will sign-off its response at the meeting on 7th February, so the comments and opinions expressed here are in draft form but are a summary of what's previously been presented.

Alternative Development Strategy Options

Six options are presented, each with different implications in terms of housing numbers for North Elmham, ranging from 0 new houses to 285. The Parish Council feels that some organic growth is suitable for the village, helping to support local businesses, the school etc. but that largerscale growth would spoil its character. Therefore, Option B is favoured, which would see 80% of the new growth across Breckland going to the market towns, with the remaining 20% to Local Service Centres such as North Elmham. This option would result in 53 new houses for our village.

Towns, Villages, Countryside

This topic is also referred to as 'further measures to protect Breckland's countryside' elsewhere on the website, and it contains the issue of whether settlements such as North Elmham should retain their settlement boundaries, or if Breckland should instead develop a criteriabased policy for deciding where new development should be allowed, including potentially outside current boundaries.

The Parish Council feels that the policy of having settlement boundaries should be continued. This is largely because a) any criteria-based policy is likely to make it easier for development in what is currently designated as countryside to take place, with developers' lawyers finding it possible to exploit any loopholes; b) new housing allocations are already invariably permitted outside existing settlement boundaries, with the boundaries then being redrawn to include them making a change of policy unnecessary; c) if settlement boundaries are abolished it will make it even less likely that so called rural exception sites for affordable housing will be made available, as landowners would understandably hold onto land to sell for more profitable market-housing schemes.

I hope this summary will help raise awareness in the consultation and encourage residents to participate in helping to decide the location and nature of future development in the village. The Consultation can be viewed from: brecklandlocalplan.commonplace.is

A FIVE YEAR CAREER WITH THE YHA

As many of you may know, Eileen and I gave a talk to the Wives Plus All group about our career with the Youth Hostels Association (YHA), and it was suggested that perhaps the odd article in the Newsletter, may be of interest.

First of all, a quick explanation of the YHA. It is an organisation setup to provide affordable accommodation in the countryside, and mainly for younger people. It has since expanded to include any place of interest and any customers of any age and is now a leisure and educational resource. Each "hostel" is run by a manager or managers plus staff according to size and business levels. Wanting a change to our everyday suburban lives, we applied for various manager posts, and were eventually appointed as joint managers of Welsh Bicknor YH.

Don't search for Welsh Bicknor on any map, it won't appear. It is a large Victorian rectory on the bank of the River Wye, between Ross-on-Wye and Monmouth. It is below Coppett Hill, hill being the operative word, and down a 1/4 mile narrow drive. Nothing bigger than a small minibus can get to it.

We arrived on a cold January afternoon, with flakes of snow in the air, to be met at the top of the drive by our new boss, with a Land rover and trailer, to help carry all our goods and chattels down to the building below. It snowed that night. There was no chance of getting our car up the drive. The building was freezing, and our predecessor left no fuel for the fires. That first night, because we had electric blankets, we were all in bed by 8 o'clock. Looking at a map, we saw that across the river is a larger village (Lydbrook), that we thought may be large enough to have an electrical shop where we could buy some form of heating.

The next morning, plodding through the snow, came the post man. I thought, he will know if there is such a shop in Lydbrook, so I asked him. He replied "I wouldn't know, that be Gloucester, I be Hereford"! Thus, we learned of the way a river can affect life in a rural area!

Just an ending to this episode, about an hour later, through the snow, came the local gamekeeper, with two electric fires. The postman had mentioned our plight, and he came to our rescue. So, we also learned how friendly and helpful people can be.

BOILED FRUIT CAKE

Line and grease a 20cm square cake tin.

Ingredients

500g mixed dried fruit (whatever you fancy) 250ml water 150g dark brown sugar Pinch of salt 125a butter 1 tsp mixed spice 1/2 tsp ground ginger 1 tsp bicarb of soda 2 eggs 125g plain flour 125g self raising flour

- 4. Stir in the eggs, then the flour. Pour into the prepared tin.
- 5. Bake for about an hour. Pour over a little sherry, cover with foil and let it cool in the tin.

In December I gave a talk to the Elmham Wives Plus group about how the local birdlife changes through the seasons. As well as changes through the seasons of the year, we also explored some of the changes that affect our birdlife over longer timescales. There are several birds that we've lost in North Elmham: Lesser Spotted Woodpecker, Red-backed Shrike, Nightingale, Willow Tit, Tree Sparrow and Corn Bunting to name but a few. Then there are a number of formerly common species that are still holding on, but rapidly heading towards extinction: examples include Cuckoo, Turtle Dove, Swift, Swallow (photo 1), House Martin, Spotted Flycatcher (photo 2) and Willow Warbler. On the other hand some species have arrived here in recent times - Red Kite (photo 3), Marsh Harrier, Buzzard, Little Egret (photo 4), Great White Egret and Cetti's Warbler for instance. Some of you will even remember a time before Collared Doves (photo 5) arrived.

There are lots of reasons why bird populations increase or decrease sometimes the reasons are clear, other times less so: sometimes there's one single reason and other times there are a number of factors contributing. Habitat destruction is a common cause of decline, often linked with modern farming practices or the construction of new properties and roads. Legislation restricting the use of certain pesticides or prohibiting egg collecting, for example, have had a positive impact. Climate change is a big one, leading to the loss of some species and the arrival of others. The decline in insect abundance is another major negative factor - though this itself







is linked to both climate change and habitat destruction.

The thing that stood out to me when preparing the talk was just how many changes in our birdlife could be traced, at least to a large degree, to climate change. As the planet warms, species' distributions tend to shift towards the poles. That means that for those of us in the Northern Hemisphere, we see species arrive that formerly occurred only to the south of us, and we lose species that might continue to be found to the north of us. With birds we see this most clearly with migratory species that are dependent on insects, like Cuckoos, Spotted Flycatchers and Willow Warblers, disappearing from much of England but, for now at least, remaining common in Scotland. We also see birds that are dependent on wetlands, like the egrets for example, shifting north from parts of southern Europe where their former haunts are becoming too arid. But in most cases, the decline in the south of their range is much more rapid than any increase in the north – overall the population trend is nearly always downward.

My talk was about birds, but if I had focussed on insects the changes would have been even more dramatic. On the plus side we have gained lots of new species – though as with birds, local gain does not mean that their global population is increasing. Negatively, we are losing lots of species too – and even more obviously, the total insect abundance is plummeting. Clancy's Rustic is an example of a moth we have gained thanks to climate change – not recorded in the UK until 2002 but now resident and spreading north. I caught my first, second and third examples here last year (photo 6). The large and extremely spectacular Garden Tiger (photo 7) is an example of a moth that we're losing. It was once a very common species in gardens but is now much rarer – I've caught a handful here over the years but the only one I've caught in the last couple of years was when I was visiting the Lake District. In the last 45 years they've declined by 88% in the UK with southern England bearing the brunt. Their downfall has been linked to climate change, in particular warm, wet winters and springs. Garden Tiger caterpillars (known as Woolly Bears as they're so hairy) are one of the favourite foods of Cuckoo, so this is also a good example of where the decline of a single insect species is directly connected with the loss of one of our most famous and iconic bird species.

The loss of species, and perhaps especially the decline in their abundance, should concern us. We should be concerned simply because we are losing amazing and beautiful animals from our environment, but more than that, we should be concerned because we cannot survive without them. Our environment is not merely a nice thing out there to enjoy when we get a chance, it's the fabric of our existence. We are part







of the ecosystem, dependent on other animals and plants whether for food, clothing, medicine, waste disposal and hygiene or just simple enjoyment and our mental health. When we fail to look after our environment and the species that live around us, we are failing to look after ourselves.

The good news is that we can all do something about this. Each and every one of us can help. You may have seen the piece in October's Elmham News entitled, "Making Positive Changes: Our Village and the Environment" (page 25). Following on from that the North Elmham Living Sustainably (NELS) group has formed and anyone in the village is invited to come along to our first event at the Eastgate Centre (on Eastgate Street) on Saturday afternoon, 24th February (see the advert on page 18). Do come along, but if you can't make it then you'll still be very welcome to join NELS (contact Nicola at nicolaruthearle@gmail.com).

Thankfully there is still lots of wildlife to see around the parish or in your gardens if you take the time to walk slowly and stop frequently to look and listen. The event does have a more serious side in that it provides plenty of material for our ever busy recorder, David Gibbons, to start our 2024 records.

ST MARY'S CHURCH

Dear Friends,

After the excitement and joy of Christmas, January can feel like a long and rather bleak month. As we move into February, we sense the lengthening of days and hopefully some bright winter sunshine. In the Church calendar, we celebrate 'Candlemas' on 2nd February (or the nearest Sunday – this year, 28th January).

Candlemas remembers 'the Presentation of Christ in the Temple', when the infant Jesus was taken to the Temple by his parents, Mary and Joseph (Luke 2:22-38). It's a charming story and the subject of many paintings down the centuries – perhaps most notably the 17th century work by Ludovico Carracci. We see Mary handing her baby to an old man called Simeon. God had promised Simeon that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah, and this was the moment!

Simeon gave us the beautiful canticle usually referred to as the Nunc Dimittis, Lord, now you are dismissing your servant in peace. Then he blesses Mary and Joseph and tells her that Jesus is destined for great things, although there is a dark undertone, when he tells Mary that a sword will pierce her soul. He is foreshadowing the grief and agony Mary will experience when her son is arrested and crucified some 33 years later.

WORTHING NEWS

Happy New Year everyone! Are your Christmas decorations now down and stored safely away? Well done, hope you had a cracking Christmas. What's next on the "agenda" I ask? Time to get the frying pans out as PANCAKE DAY is just around the corner.

Here you go mums & dads, and children, your time to raid the kitchen cupboards to use up eggs, flour and milk on TUESDAY, 13th February - Shrove Tuesday, the day before the start of Lent.

To take part and get started, you will need:

- 125g plain flour
- 1 egg
- 300ml milk

And so, the fun begins. If you've no recipe of your own, try this one below, how to make your pancakes:

- Sift flour into a bowl and make a hole in the middle. In a separate bowl, whisk together the egg and milk and pour them into the hole.
- Whisk the mix with some flour and gradually start adding the rest of the flour until you have a smooth batter. Cover the bowl and leave for 30 minutes.
- Heat a frying pan to a medium heat and spray some cooking oil. Using a ladle, pour some of the mixture into the pan and tilt the pan until it spreads out evenly.
- Cook one side of the pancake until it's golden or lightly brown and toss or flip it over, or if you are not brave enough, use a slice or palette knife will help. Cooking time will depend on the hob but it's usually about 45-60 seconds on each side.
- Make sure to spray cooking oil before each pancake and cook until the batter is finished.
- Stack all pancakes and add your favourite toppings which could be some scrummie and mouth watering layers with perhaps syrup, lemon, fruit, ice cream or even chocolate, but enjoy while you can before any fasting begins during Lent.

I wonder however, who will succeed in tossing their pancake and leaving it stuck on the ceiling?

The Christian tradition of Lent will begin on Ash Wednesday 14th February for 40 days and ends Saturday 30th March. This is when many Christians prepare for Easter by observing a period of fasting, repentance, moderation and spiritual discipline. Time is set aside for reflection on Jesus Christ – his suffering and his sacrifice, his life, death, burial and resurrection. With this in mind, Worthing Church will be holding a luncheon, we hope you are able to join us.
