NORTH ELMHAM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 4TH DECEMBER 2024

The following information is taken from the Draft PC minutes and may be expanded where the Editors feel more explanation is necessary. The full official minutes can be viewed in the Post Office and on the Community website, once approved.

Public Participation

The condition of 55 Eastgate Street was queried. It has been empty for a number of years and is becoming derelict. It is believed that the owner previously applied for permission to build an additional property on the site. It was agreed that the Clerk would draw this matter to the attention of Breckland Council.

Councillors Present Were: Mr. P. Grainger (Chairman), Mr. M. Phillips (Vice Chairman), Miss A. Ferris, Mr. T. Fitzalan Howard, Mrs. A. Keeble, Mr. J. Labouchere, Nr. N. Markwell, Mr. M. Rayner and Mr. F. Gillespie.

Also in Attendance: Mr. K. Webb (Clerk), Mr. B. Borrett (County and District Councillor), who left after a few minutes to attend another meeting, and one parishioner.

Apologies for Absence: Mr. B. Gee, Mr. C. Smith and Mr. G. Bambridge (District Councillor).

Report from County and District Councillor

Mr. Borrett provided an update on the reorganisation of local government and devolution. The leader of Norfolk County Council had recently met with the minister in Westminster, and it was confirmed that the previous devolution deal is no more. A white paper has not yet been produced but it should be available by the end of the year. Norfolk and Suffolk are expected to have a combined mayoral authority. There is a real fear that this may result in a future loss of local democratic accountability.

Updated Information And Matters Arising

Land Management Matters

Village Green: Work on some repairs to the zip wire has not yet started and Mr. Phillips is to chase. It has been mentioned by some parishioners that dog waste is regularly not being cleared up at a number of places in the village. There are signs on the Village Green. It was stressed that the registration plates of any vehicle owners guilty of not clearing up after their dogs should be noted and duly reported.

Church Meadow: The new trench is working well.

Street Lights

Westcotec are dealing with the issue of the smaller light near 29 Eastgate Street. The older one was hanging by a thread.

Highway Matters

The matter regarding the temporary bus stop near the County School Station junction will be chased by the Clerk. Matt Lines, Highways Engineer, has assisted with our Parish Partnership bid for measures to improve road safety throughout the village. An application has been made covering a cost of £15,668.51 with the County Council requested to provide 50%, i.e. £7,834.00. Proposed by Mr. Phillips and seconded by Miss Ferris. All in favour.

Pavilion and Playing Field

Miss Ferris reported that work on the showers is to be done on 12th December. She has contacted the Football Club regarding outstanding fees and the sum of £250 is to be paid in the near future.

The switch on of the Christmas lights is to take place at 6.00 p.m. on Friday, 6th December. Thanks were expressed to all volunteers for their work with the lights.

The contract for the general waste bin is due for renewal. Biffa had previously suggested an increase of 17% but, after

negotiations, a rather more appropriate rise of 4.2% was offered. This would effectively increase the four-weekly charge from £51.04 to £53.20. All agreed to accept the new figure. The Clerk will advise Biffa accordingly.

Both Nurture and Groundscape had visited with a view to providing quotations in respect of the grounds maintenance contract for 2025. They were shown round by Messrs Phillips and Gee, and Mrs. Keeble. John Piller, principal of Groundscape, impressed all members and has submitted a quotation, covering 17 cuts per season (March to October), totalling £5,718.00. This price is fixed for three years. Unfortunately, nothing was forthcoming from Nurture. Mr. Phillips proposed to employ Groundscape as the grounds maintenance contractor for next year and this was seconded by Mrs. Keeble. All in favour.

Eastgate Centre

A tarpaulin is in place.

Brookside Development Update

Solicitors from both sides are liaising regarding the current position.

Overview of Parish Council Financial Situation

The Chairman is to make contact with Cambridge Building Society so that he can be included as one of the authorised signatories on the account.

Defibrillators

Miss Ferris has bought a new torch for £9.99.

North Elmham Living Sustainably (NELS) Group

An invitation has been made to the Group to attend a future meeting of the Parish Council.

Churchyards – Current Situation and Future Plans

Mr. Rayner said that some concerns had been raised at the last meeting and there hadn't yet been a response from the PCC. Mr. Fitzalan Howard felt that this was not a religious issue and that every parishioner has the right to be buried in the village. It is a facility for all residents. Mr. Labouchere supported this view but accepts that not many people actually attend church. It is, however, a village asset which is available for all to use. Mr. Gillespie said that if an annual grant of £2K was to be given for the next three years, it should be acknowledged that this would be the limit of the Parish Council's assistance over that period. Mr. Phillips proposed that the Parish Council should make a grant of £2K per year to the PCC for the next three years. This was supported by Mr. Fitzalan Howard. Six members were in favour of the proposition, with two members being against.

Parish Precept 2025/2026

A small deficit of about £800 is forecast for the year 2025/2026. The Band D contribution remains at the current figure of £80.64 for the seventh consecutive year. The tax base has increased to 523.4 (from 503.9) which results in a Precept of £42,207.

Village Hall

Mrs. Keeble is of the opinion that the Memorial Hall is becoming in a state which makes it not fit for purpose. Miss Ferris concurred with this view. It was agreed that progress needs to be made with the plans for a new village hall. The matter will be discussed at the next meeting.

Parish Charities Update

Mr. Phillips confirmed that the merger of the Church and Town Land General Branch Charity with the North Elmham United Charities had been completed. In addition, all funds in the Diamond Jubilee Green Support Trust, (£6,752.69), have been transferred to the Parish Council's Bank account.

Christmas Arrangements

A Christmas tree is up and the invoice will be received in due course.

Planning Applications and Determinations

There were no applications or determinations.

Correspondence

- 1) Advice from Highways that the Rangers will be visiting the village "over the coming weeks" (the Chairman will attempt to obtain a more specific time when he next speaks to Mr. Lines of Highways).
- 2) Request from parishioner for assistance with trimming some trees that are next to the property's garden and for a dog waste bin to be sited on the adjacent path (members to visit the site to inspect)
- 3) Notification of the commencement of a draft consultation on draft recommendations for ward boundaries in Breckland.
- 4) Request to instal a memorial bench in the village. All in favour and suggest siting on the Village Green. The Clerk is to establish the preferred type of bench low maintenance suggested.

Any Other Matters (For Information Only)

Mr. Labouchere mentioned that he is still in possession of his extremely popular camel which had been in the play area for some time before it was "temporarily" removed. It was agreed that the camel should be welcomed back soon.

This was to be Mr. Labouchere's last meeting and he had notified the Parish Council of his intention to stand down in a letter dated 12th October, 2024. He was warmly thanked by all for his outstanding contribution to local communities over a considerable period of time which involved 44 years as a Councillor for three parishes and 16 years as a District Councillor.

If you are injured by a dog or it damages your property you can report it to the Police by either phoning 101 or going online at Norfolk Constabulary and looking up "Abandoned and Nuisance Dogs".

SUBMITTING PHOTOS FOR THE ELMHAM NEWS

We love including your photos that capture special moments and scenes from our community in the Elmham News. To ensure your photos can be featured, we need them to be submitted in high quality. Often, photos sent via email or messaging apps on phones or tablets are compressed, which reduces their resolution. While they may look great on your screen, they often appear blurry or pixelated on my computer and will reproduce the same way in the printed magazine.

Best Ways to Submit Photos

To help us include your photos in the magazine, please submit the originals using one of the following methods. If you are forwarding a photo from someone else please ask them to send it to me direct.

1. Upload to a Cloud Service

Upload the original, unedited photo from your device to a cloud service such as Google Drive, Dropbox, or OneDrive. Once uploaded, email me the link. If you prefer, I can provide access to a Dropbox folder—just email me for details.

2. Email

Email is fine as long as you attach the original, "actual size" photo. Many phones and tablets compress photos when sent via their mail apps, so please check your mail app settings. If you're unsure how to do this, email me your device model, and I'll try and help you figure it out.

On a Mac or PC, ensure you attach the JPEG file rather than embedding or pasting it in the email body.

3. WhatsApp

Sending photos via WhatsApp is okay if the "Media Upload Quality" is set to "HD." To enable this, go to "Settings", then "Storage and Data" in the app.

Don't Copy & Paste Photos

Please do not copy and paste photos into a MS Word document (or similar program). This results in low-resolution images that often cannot be used. Instead, attach your photos separately from your article as JPEG files.

If you're still having trouble, then we could arrange a time for you to pop in and see me, I'm always happy to help you find the best way to submit your photos. Don't hesitate to contact me if you need any help!

REMEMBERING LOVED ONES

JACQUIE BRAYBROOK

Jacquie was born on 11th March 1941 at Senter Farm, the first child of Rene and Gilbert Clarke, followed by a brother, Roger. The Clarkes, of course, are one of the big farming families in Elmham and Senter Farm was very much the hub of Clarke life. Gilbert himself was one of seven children and so there were a lot of cousins!

The other Clarke spur was 'Tuddy' – South Tuddenham – home to Gilbert's cousins, now farmed by Stephen (brother David died last year).

Jacquie's school life begun at Elmham School; then onto Neatherd, taking the train from here to Dereham. Jacquie went on to Teacher Training College and it was through teaching that she met Trevor, when they were both teaching in Newmarket.

Trevor was promoted to Deputy Head at Methwold School and following their marriage, the couple bought a house in Watton. John was born in 1969. After a couple of years, Jacquie's parents decided to retire, and it was around this time that Roger moved to New Zealand.

And so it was that Jacquie and Trevor moved to Senter Farm – a homecoming for Jacquie. Trevor continued teaching and the couple managed the farm between them. Mostly arable, with 25 acres of barley, they also had a beef herd, keeping the cows for breeding, and sheep, which Jacquie hated! Mark was born in 1972, completing their family.

For Jacquie, the 1950s, 60s and 70s were the golden era, forming lifelong friends in the local farming community, including the Bidewell family and friendships formed through Young Farmers (John Caley). She resisted modernisation, preferring a



traditional rural lifestyle. The Norfolk Show was a 'must' and she would regularly be selling at Norwich Saturday market when the boys were at Norwich School.

Jacquie's heart was always her home and family, coming together at Christmas and New Year in each other's houses, as well as picnics, barbeques and bonfire night.

Family holidays when her boys were young would be spent around the UK once the barley and hay were in – staying at Farmhouse bed & breakfasts.

Outside farm and family life, Jacquie was a big John Wayne fan and loved music – especially entertainers like Val Doonican and Don Williams. She saw many bands performing live, including Status Quo and Hot Chocolate; another of her favourites was Roxy Music and their front man Bryan Ferry.

But Jacquie also threw herself into Village life – she was a governor at Elmham School

and a member of the Parochial Church Council and Flower Festival Committee.

And, of course, there were the dogs: Nestle the English Sheepdog; Dick the terrier; Sherpa, a golden retriever; and Moses, a longhaired German shepherd. The surprise was Chester; a Labrador/Collie cross – Trevor just went and got him one day as the latest in a long line of dogs.

The other surprise were the donkeys, when the boys were each given a donkey for Christmas! It was Jacquie, of course, who cared for them!

Trevor died 2002 and this hit Jacquie really hard. Life, of course, would never be the same, but Jacquie took strength from family and friends. She had a particularly close bond with her aunt Ruth (Gilbert's youngest sister) and the two of them would travel together and Ruth was a regular for Sunday lunch at the Farm. Her cousin Ann Ketteringham and friend Beattie Gay were constant companions and Jacquie and Ann explored the world together, including Peru, Botswana, New Zealand and Australia.

John and Mark tell me that Jacquie lived a charmed life in many ways – a life well lived, despite developing Parkinson's and dementia in older age. Having already had a knee replacement, it was following a hip replacement that Jacquie – rather reluctantly at first – moved into the Annexe that John and Mark had had built at Senter Farm, with her family all around her. She was very stoic, suffering in silence and not wishing to be a burden to those she loved.

As well as supporting her family through education, being the hub of their social life and being on-site baby sitter, Jacquie kept her lifelong friends. Very kindhearted and always looking after other people, Jacquie led a life of service to others.

May she rest in peace.

IAN LOTHIAN 1944 - 1924

Every village has a 'character' and Worthing had Ian.

Ian had lived in the village with his wife Steph for 35 years and everybody knew him. Ian was outspoken, said what he thought and didn't suffer fools. He had a wealth of knowledge about almost everything and was always keen to impart this knowledge to anyone who would listen, whether they wanted it or not. He loved his garden and growing vegetables which were always to be found at the end of his drive for anyone to take.

Ian and Steph were my neighbours for 15 years. I was a novice gardener when I arrived and Ian taught me everything I needed to know. He gently steered me in the right direction if he thought i wasn't doing things quite right (or his way) which I greatly appreciated. From the outset we got the measure of one another and had a good understanding of each other – he talked and I listened.

Ian had a heart operation early 2023. It took a long time for him to regain his strength and he wasn't able to do so much in the garden, it became a chore and he became very frustrated. He struggled on until it became too much and recently he was admitted to hospital and it was discovered that his heart was failing. During his time in hospital his wife Steph became poorly and she was also admitted to hospital - they were in adjoining wards and Ian would sit by her side each day. Sadly, Steph passed away in October with Ian by her side. Ian was lost without Steph, they had been together for 55 years and everything Ian did was for Steph. Ian discharged himself from hospital to be at home where he passed away on the 18th November – he didn't want to be without his Steph.

The village has lost a 'character', I have lost my friend. I will miss our long chats over the garden fence, I will miss his long stories, I will miss his guiding hand.

Living in a village, particularly a small Hamlet like Broom Green, I've always had the opportunity to keep a flock of chickens. The humble hen has been a part of my life since before I could walk. My grandparents kept them and when they in their old age moved into an annex next to us the chickens came with them. My grandmother favoured Coucou Marans, a medium weight breed with mottled feathers that lay lovely dark brown eggs whereas I, being around six at the time would take anything with interesting colours or odd feathers leading to my contribution to the flock being a mixed bag of fluffy multi coloured birds of questionable parentage. Throw a few ducks and a couple of geese into the mix and I was never far from poultry although back then my keenest subject of study was their eggs. In my opinion there is nothing so glorious on a miserable autumn morning than a couple of nice soft boiled eggs and toasted soldiers. And here, after my mildly self-indulgent nostalgic rambling, we get to the

point. I think more people should keep chickens, and many would be surprised at just how cheap and easy they are to buy, house, feed and care for. The other surprise for many is just how useful these birds can be, particularly in a small garden. Eggs of course are the very obvious bonus, having a pet that pays rent can't be bad. The average hen lays one every day and a half and they keep (unrefrigerated as long as you don't wash them) for two weeks so unless you have an enormous appetite for eggs, three chickens is more than enough to keep the average household well supplied. Chickens are easy to tame, can be loving pets, fascinating to watch and can provide services to the gardener well beyond a supply of eggs so why don't more people have them?

I think firstly there's a misconception that chickens are solely livestock and cannot provide the other salient benefits a garden pet such as a rabbit can, and I use rabbits as an example because the investment in time, space and feed costs is similar. This perception of them as

just livestock is entirely false. Chickens are so easy to socialise, a few weeks of hand feeding and handling and they're as tame and affectionate as any lap dog. They even purr when stroked in a sort of chirpy vibrato. They're inquisitive and surprisingly intelligent little creatures who will quickly learn as much about you and your habits as you do about theirs. They'll gladly inform you if you're late letting them out, or they're hungry, or that whatever is in your hand looks edible.

Secondly there's cost, the idea of having livestock seems expensive but chickens are cheap, really cheap. If you go through a charity that rescues ex farm birds (who are otherwise slaughtered at 72 weeks old) you can pay as little as £2.75 a bird. I source mine from an organisation called Fresh Start For Hens who are easy to find with a quick internet search. These birds are usually Bovans Goldline Hybrid, prolific layers specifically bred for the egg industry. For your money you'll get a nice little brown farm hen, one usually already well socialised and ready to lay eggs. These girls are usually a little worse for wear at first with scruffy feathers and bald spots but a few weeks in the sun and a fresh moult and they'll be lovely full feathered birds. For accommodation all they need is a dry place to sleep with about 20 cm of perch space per bird and a couple of nest boxes. Outside, as long as they can access a small run and are allowed out for supervised strolls around the rest of the garden, they'll be perfectly content. Feeding them is just as cheap, £9.00 or so for a bag of corn from the feed merchant, supplemented with a few treats here and there (they love a head of cabbage hung from a string just high enough that they have to hop to get it) as well as what they can scavenge on their jaunts around the lawn.

Other than the eggs though, what benefits can they have? Well, there

are many, and some are less obvious than others. Aside from the love and wellbeing you get from any pet, chickens can provide a number of services around the garden. They're excellent pest controllers for a start. If you're gardening let them help, they'll pick out slugs and other garden pests far better than you can. If you have a vegetable garden, the manure from the coop is an amazing fertiliser and if you can make the coop and run moveable, letting your chickens have free reign in your garden during the off season is a great way to keep the area weed free and introduce nitrates into the soil.

There are of course downsides, like any small pet, be it a rabbit or guinea pig, the food chickens eat attracts rats and should you fail to keep the area clean, you may find yourself with some extra furry residents in your garden. Personally I find a hanging feeder and regular cleaning seems to keep them away for the most part. Regular cleaning also stops any unpleasant smells, another common issue with garden pets. DEFRA also requires you to register your flock, even if it's a single bird these days and whilst that bureaucracy is a bit of a pain, it is a necessary step to prevent bird flu outbreaks as we've seen in previous years.

Ultimately I don't expect you to run out and buy three chickens, a small coop and all the other supplies tomorrow just because I think it's a good idea, but next time you crack a supermarket egg and the yolk seems pale and the white seems runny, or your children ask you if they can get a rabbit, or you wonder what to do with that awkward area behind the garden shed that always seems to just be covered with weeds I hope you'll give chickens a passing thought.



ELMHAM WILDLIFE







This year I will try focusing on just one



I'm going to start off with the Dunnock, a common but unobtrusive garden bird that many of you will be familiar with, but some of you might never have noticed.



The Dunnock is sometimes called Hedge Sparrow. They're not sparrows but they are often seen in hedges and I suppose they do look a little bit like sparrows - at least in so much as they're small greyish-brown birds (photo 1). Their diet is completely different as you can see from the shape of their bill. Sparrows are largely (though not entirely) vegetarian and like finches, buntings and other seed-eaters, they have thick bills suited for cracking open seeds. Dunnocks eat a lot more insects and other small invertebrates and like other insectivorous species they have much finer bills suited for picking off small moving prey.

The powers that be tried to rename them Hedge Accentor, a name that is more accurate than Hedge Sparrow as they belong to a family of birds called accentors, but this name isn't used very much in the UK and most of us still call them Dunnocks. It's the only species of accentor that normally occurs in Britain but you might possibly have seen the slightly larger Alpine Accentor if you've been skiing in the Alps (for example).

Dunnocks are usually shy birds that spend a lot of time on the ground. You may see them out in the open (photo 2) but as often as not they'll be discreetly shuffling around in borders or at the base of hedges. Sometimes they can be seen under bird tables picking up scraps dropped by other birds.

They do fly up into hedges and trees (not usually very high up) and when they sing (photo 3) they might choose a relatively prominent position to sing from. They have a pleasing warbling song, somewhat repetitive and sometimes rendered as "leathery leathery leathery". The other sound they make most often is a much less pleasant call, a shrill "tseep".

Dunnocks have brown backs streaked darker (photo 4) but underneath they are plain greyish (photo 5) with streaking restricted to the sides. Juvenile birds seen in the summer (photo 6) are more extensively streaked below.

You will very likely have a Dunnock or two in your garden. They don't flock in large numbers like sparrows so you probably won't see many at one time. If you haven't noticed them before look out and listen out for them. Although some do migrate Dunnocks can be found in our gardens and the countryside all year round. You can find them virtually anywhere around our parish.

Keep an eye out for Dunnocks next time you go for a walk or look out into your garden, and notice if you hear them singing (they are already singing at this time of year). 25 YEAR CAREER IN THE YHA

After 25 years of working in the YHA, we approached retirement. We had managed four very different hostels, one in the Wye Valley, one in north Essex, one on the mid Wales coast and one in the Forest of Dean. A Victorian rectory, a timber framed building in a cute village, a house that had once belonged to a retired sea captain, and a medieval castle. How's that for variety. We had some good times and some not so good, but never boring. When we first started we had two pieces of advice from an experienced warden. The first was that no matter how much the job was getting us down, always remember that due to the nature of the job we would live in beautiful places. and we did. The second was to stay in the housing market so we would have somewhere to live if it all went wrong. This we did. Upon retirement, we thought about where we would like to live. Our hearts were in Wales and the Welsh borders, but the wet weather of the West is a drawback. We decided to move to the drier East of England, and so finished up in North Elmham, a decision we have never regretted. Incidentally Eileen and I first met on a caravan site in West Runton in 1959, and were married in 1962. These holiday romances never work!

Meanwhile, the YHA carries on. Nothing like the organisation we joined. There was always a hostel within an easy days cycle ride, and in some areas, within a days walk. Since then a number of hostels have been sold, to either carry on as cheap accommodation, or as private dwellings. The remainder have been hugely upgraded, and prices hugely increased. In our area there used to be hostels in Kings Lynn, Hunstanton, Wells, Sheringham, Great Yarmouth, and Norwich. Now, only Sheringham is in the hands of the YHA. The emphasis seems now to be in cities,

though, coming from Birmingham, as I do, I am surprised that the second city still does not have one!

Thank you for following these ramblings and for the nice things that have been said to us about them. Thank you also to those who produce our wonderful village magazine, it does you credit.

ST MARY'S CHURCH ROOD SCREEN UPDATE

Many of you will have noticed that we have been publishing photos and information about the beautiful Rood Screen in our church which divides the Chancel from the main body of the church, or the Nave. There has also been extensive coverage in the press.

The original screen was composed of three parts and work begun in 1457, painting begun in 1474 and in 1561 parts were whitewashed and others dismantled. The current screen was restored in 1882. The Reformation played havoc with churches and many rood screens were vandalized, ours was cleared away and the painted panels shifted into obscure corners, and some were used as floorboards!

The actual layout of the Saints is a legacy from the 19th Century when

there was a certain amount of carpentry rearrangement. Not all the panels match, some are taller, wider, more ornate and with a section of unpainted wood.

A comprehensive explanation of the panels is to be found in the "Jewel in the Crown. The riddle of Elmham's Rood Screen" by Rebecca Bradshaw who wrote this as part of an in depth study for her degree at the University of East Anglia. A copy of which is to be found at the back of the church and it makes fascinating reading.

At the present time the screen was in urgent need of restoration and protection against woodworm.

However, the church was extremely fortunate to receive a gift in memory of a beloved parishioner which enabled a team of professional restorers to be called in to appraise and then carry out the work immediately.

Conservators from the firm of Kiffy Stainer-Hutchins of Houghton began work and finished the first stage of the conservation at the end of October 2024.

We know that several people went up to see work on cleaning progress and were made welcome by the team who were happy to explain what they were doing. First, a layer of recent (19th century?) varnish had to be removed and the dirt behind it was cleaned away. This has now been done for the entire screen. The next task was to remove a further layer

of varnish under the dirt in one panel. The middle figure in the photograph had this extra cleaning and it was clear that it would be good if the whole screen had this extra clean before a new layer of protective varnish was put on. As all this could be done within the budget, we asked that the work continue so that the whole screen was cleaned and restored to its former glory.

Work began again mid-November and was completed by Christmas 2024, when it was enjoyed by all those who came into the church over the festive season. We hope that many more people will come and see the completed work and enjoy the beauty of this fine example of fifteenth-century art.



Due to the reorganisation of the Benefice, we are trialling a slight change to the




