She had taken over the growing of them from her mother in law, so served an apprenticeship with her. She supplies peonies for weddings, and special occasions and ships them all over the UK as well as selling them locally.

She was devasted to tell us that she had been unable to bring us any peonies as the inclement weather meant they were nor ready to pick! The buds need to feel like marshmallow before being picked, so that they will open.

Peonies have a long history and Kew recorded them in 1789 but they were used for medicinal purposes around 200BC.

Today, as well as making beautiful floral decorations, Sarah sells her white ones to a factory in the North West of England where it is put into gin to make a floral gin.

Sarah chose Dawn's offering of a rose called "Eyes For You" (pictured above), as our Flower of the Month.

In June, we will have visited Peter Beales Roses for tea and a tour through their lovely rose beds.

# **FRUIT PICKING**

If you lived here in Elmham from the summers of the early 1950's up to the late 1960's, you would have known where to go to earn a few extra shillings to supplement the family finances for school uniforms, or shoes for school in September. If you were a mum at home, with a bike, you could take your pick of where to go! You would have known what fruit was ripe first and where was the best 'well paying' farm to cycle to.

Out would come the Thermos flask and battered tin for sandwiches, pump up the tyres and off you would go.

Here in the village, there was always the blackcurrant season from June onwards, at Air Vice Marshall Don's estate. The field of currants stretched from the side of the wood near the present footpath, across to the new line of trees today (actually, the footpath in the 50's and 60's went through the wood in a wavy line, the present footpath was made much later).

Everyone had lightweight baskets to fill – sorry can't remember the weight you were supposed to put into the basket. When weighed if you were overweight some of the currants would be taken out and given back to you in an empty basket as a starter for the next one. All the pickers had to be finished by 4pm as the lorry came to transport the currants to Tunstead. I believe they went to a Ribena factory somewhere near Great Yarmouth.

Later on, the estate grew blackberries for a number of seasons instead of blackcurrants. When Mr Robin Don took over the running of the estate after the death of his father, being a Master of Wine, he had a Vineyard planted opposite the dovecote and also in front of the church.

If you didn't mind a bike ride, Gorgate Hall also had blackcurrants, later to be picked by machine, but in the 50's/60's it was all done by hand. I can also remember sometime in the 1950's as a young teenager biking there to pick French beans,

a back breaking job as you had to bend over all the time you were picking them.

Whilst at Billingford, the Parfitt family had strawberries to be picked. Fine, if not too squishy, then you had the straw which was around the plants to wipe your hands on and clean them., Wherever you might be picking soft fruit, if the fruit was handled too much or squeezed you were always told in no uncertain terms not to do it again!!

If you fancied biking to Bintree, the Howard family had gooseberries earlier in the season... gooseberry bushes are cruel, and will grab you if you are not careful and rip you to shreds!

If you were a regular summer picker of soft fruit and you suddenly get a whiff of strawberries or blackcurrants you are immediately taken back to those fruit fields and a different era all together.

Most of the workforces were women, the only time they were working whilst being mum at home. They all worked very hard, were wonderful workers – but if you quietly walked down the rows the gossip was wonderful. As a child you learned alot... most of which you couldn't understand!!

**May 20 v Swaffham 2 (A) League** B&NE 356-4 Swaffham 106. B&NE won by 250 runs

With Callum Futter leading the Saturday team for the first time, his decision to bat first paid off as the B&NE batters demolished the bowling attack, Ollie Jaggard leading the way with 124 ably supported by opener Josh Hall (80) and a very swift 85 from Abdul Ali. With Sinclair and Ali removing the first 5 home batsmen for just 9 runs, the home side did show resilience in reaching a hundred, but B&NE maintained their unbeaten start to the season.

# GERALD SHANTON MARSH

2 MAY 1930 - 22 APRIL 2023

Gerald was born here in North Elmham to Daisy May and Robert Marsh where they lived on the High Street. He had two older brothers, Kenneth and Raymond. He attended the local school and then went on to Crown Road in Dereham, leaving school at 14 to take up an apprenticeship in the building trade with Potter Bros of Dereham.

In October 1950 he joined The Royal Army Service Corps.George V1 was still King when he left on HMT Empire Windrush for service in the Middle East. He served as a Baker 2nd Class for the duration of his National Service.

He often told us of the story of when he went up on deck to a small area they used for R&R between shifts and forgot to use any suncream. Returning below deck some hours later, his colleagues laughed so much as he was like a lobster. He returned home on HMT Empire Ken by which time Queen Elizabeth 11 was on the throne. He was discharged from the Army on 24 October 1952 and resumed worked for Potters. As small children, we can remember him being picked up and dropped off in the evening by their red van.

Dad joined the Royal British Legion in 1948 and he was the Group 6 Standard Bearer for about 64 years. He had the same pair of shoes that he used only on parade and they had to shine!! On many occasions, for about 10 years I was honoured to carry the Women's Section Standard alongside my Dad. We always had a little competition to see who had the shiniest shoes, and I am sorry to say Dad, that on many occasions, it was me! The one occasion that stands out for me was when we both carried the Standards in the service that is held at the Menin Gate in Ypres each evening. That was a very proud day for us both. He was a much respected member of the





Legion and when Dad ended his carrer carrying the Standard, my brother Andrew followed in his footsteps.

Dad played bowls for as long as I can remember. He loved getting out on the Green and playing with his buddies.

Andrew proudly remembers playing with him in a Pairs Competition at Blakeney which they won.

He was very well known for playing the bones and was an accomplished performer, even making it onto YouTube following a performance at an Old Comrades Evening in the Institute. He would take his bones with him and cheekily pretend that he wasn't going

to play them, all the while waiting to be asked up on stage where he would give a sterling performance well into his 80's.

He was known to pedal his bicycle down Church Hill very fast, as he was sure he could make the 30 mph sign flash. Sadly, he never made it although it wasn't for the lack of trying, knowing Dad.

As soon as Spring arrived, Dad would be seen around the village in his shorts, surgical stockings and sandals. Since his passing, many people have said they will miss that sight!

Over many years, my dad belonged to the Royal British Legion and Elmham Institute Bowls Club, where he was also groundsman for many years.

He mowed the grass in the Cathedral Ruins. He was a Church Warden and caretaker of the Memorial Institute. He belonged to the Photographic Club and the Horticultural Club. At the Annual Flower Festivals he could be seen directing traffic in his fluorescent jacket.

He played snooker in the Memorial Hall on a Friday with his pals. My son, Matthew fondly remembers going with grandad and playing along with him and his friends. He was known for treading the boards when the Elmham Players were in existence.

He must hold the title of Elmham's Oldest Paperboy as he used to deliver papers for Pam and Steve who owned the village shop, until he was about 82.

For many years he had a allotment on Dereham Road and he spent many happy hours tending his fruit and veg. I remember abundances of gooseberries and rhubarb.I am pretty certain that over the years, most of the allotment holders had a piece of his lovely rhubarb plant. He always took part in the Horticultural Annual Show, whether it was carrots or onions, he didn't mind if he didn't win, it was the taking part that mattered to him.

# **HONEY**

It's the time of the year when the bee keeper will start extracting honey from his/her hives. The honey in the hive is in a section called a "super". In the supers are frames of flat sheets of wax. The bees draw out their tiny cells from this base. These are tilted at 15 degrees to the horizontal to hold the honey. When these cells are filled the bees cap the cells with a layer of wax. However, they will not cap the cells until the moisture content in the honey is below 20% as honey with a higher moisture content will not keep and will ferment. This is why the beekeeper will only remove fully or almost fully capped frames from the hive. Fermented honey was used by monks in the Middle Ages to

produce mead. Mead and ales were safer to drink than water!!

The beekeeper removes the frames and has to de-cap all the frames before putting them in a centrifugal drum to spin out the honey. It is then filtered and put into jars. This is then termed "Raw Honey". All honey will granulate over time. It is dependent on the food source the bees are feeding on. Oil seed rape honey granulates quite quickly due to the glucose content of the pollen. In large scale honey production, the honey is pasteurised, and heat treated to keep it in a liquid state.



# Heat Stroke Kills Dogs

Every year our emergency vets treat hundreds of heat stroke cases and, heartbreakingly, some end in tragedy. Many are a result of owners exercising their dogs between 8am and 8pm when temperatures can be at their peak.

Heat-related illnesses are almost always preventable, but it's critical to know when dogs are at risk. Our handy guide shows when it's safe for your dog outside.



**OUTDOOR TEMPERATURE** 

32+°C

10/10 Risk rating

Heat stroke is a major risk regardless of condition, size or breed.

28-31°C



Dangerous for all, but life-threatening for larger breeds and puppies as well as dogs who are flat-faced or obese.

24-27°C



Extreme caution should be taken as most dogs, particularly those who are large, obese, flat-faced and very young, will find these temperatures very uncomfortable.

20-23°C



Even at this temperature dogs are at risk of getting heat stroke if exercised too rigorously, or suffering from an underlying condition such as obesity or breathing difficulties.

16-19°C



Generally safe to exercise dogs at all times of day, although keep a close eye on large, obese and flat-faced breeds.

12-15°C

1/10 Risk rating

No evidence of heat stroke risk so enjoy your walk.

# FOR THE DOG WALKERS OF NORTH ELMHAM

A great pleasure of living in the parish is the abundance of beautiful walks. However, as we are seeing daytime temperatures increase, as does the risk to dogs being walked in the heat.

It has been disheartening to see dogs being walked throughout the day, even when temperatures have been reaching the high 20's. As a vet living in the village, I strongly urge those walking dogs during the heat of the day to please stop immediately; walking early in the morning and in the evening when the heat and tarmac is cooler is important to ensure you do not unnecessarily expose your dog to the risk of heat stroke (a condition, every year, vets see dogs die because of) and painful burning blisters on the pads suffered from contact with the hot tarmac.

No dog ever died from missing a walk, but many, every year, die from being walked in the heat. PLEASE think before grabbing that lead.



# **Updated Information and Matters Arising**

### **Land Management Matters**

**Village Green:** The grass has been cut today. A quotation of £3.8K + VAT has been obtained to carry out the necessary work on the trees. Two other quotations are to be obtained. The annual RoSPA inspection is to take place in June. One item possibly requires attention before

the visit. Mr. Phillips will discuss the matter with NGF Play Ltd.

**Cathedral Ruins:** The cost of a Charles III seat (three seater) is £1,038. Mr. Fitzalan Howard proposed that one be purchased and this was seconded by Mr. Markwell. All in favour.

**Broom Green:** Mr. Labouchere advised it is planned for the pond to receive attention during the last week in June with, hopefully, the necessary machinery being supplied by Messrs. Goff and Cook.

Bridleway on Disused Railway Line and Other Railway Linked Matters: The footpath and Church Lane bridge are to be temporarily closed to enable the necessary work to be carried out. The permissive signs have been removed and replaced by signs referring to the word "lineside".

**Prince William Wood:** Mr. Markwell has identified five dead trees which are well hidden.

Church Meadow: Mr. Fitzalan Howard said that the north side of the church is very damp. The original intention was for a trench to be dug which would turn right to the graveyard. After consideration, it is proposed to dig a trench across Church Meadow with a pipe to be taken to the edge of Jubilee Wood where there is a ditch. All were in favour of this course of action.



# **ELMHAM IN 1826**

In 1926, our Vicar, the Rev Ernest Townsend gave a talk to the members of the Elmham W.I, entitled 'A Hundred years ago'. I hope you will bear with me as I am copying a lot of the text from his talk over the next few months here in the News.

This talk was published as a booklet by A.F.Mason, Market Place, East Dereham and all profits were to be given to the North Elmham Churchyard Fund. I have no idea just what the booklet cost to buy or how many were sold.

The Rev Townsend was trying to present the appearance of Parish Life before the Enclosure Act was applied to Elmham (1829). He said ' in order to meet the great problem of finding food for a rapidly increasing population at a time when food from other countries was not imported and when England had practically to support her people – various acts were passed, whereby the large tracts of waste or common lands attached to the villages were enclosed and brought into cultivation.

The Enclosure of the Commons changed the whole appearance of the countryside and caused great dissatisfaction which is not to be wondered at seeing that it deprived the Cottagers of the immemorial privilege of pasture for their cow, donkey, geese etc".

'Let us now imagine ourselves as living in the year 1826. How marked are the changes that have since occurred!

As regard means of locomotion – there were no railways – no pedal bicycles much less motor cycles or motor cars, the waggon, the Pack and Saddle horse and the Mail Coach supplied the means of transit. Many people never left their own village –a trip to Norwich was an affair to be talked about! A visit to the seaside a rare event!! A visit to London an adventure!!!

There was no 1 1/2d.Postage – no Telegram –no daily Newspapers – no Free imports – no Free Education.

There was no machinery employed on the land, everything – sowing, reaping, threshing etc was done by hand.

There were no machine –made clothes or boots, no Tradesmen's carts from outside called with goods, no meat from abroad, no canned foods. Handicrafts and Cottage industries were carried on in each village which, if of considerable size as was ours, was practically a self-supporting community with Trades-men sufficient to supply its needs.

Intermarriage between those of the adjoining or of the same village was inevitable, and hence the marked clanship of the rural districts '

### **Public Participation**

A parishioner felt that there would be a number of advantages arising from planting fruit trees (apples, pears, etc) in the bottom area of the Village Green. Amongst other things, it would encourage people (especially children) to eat more fruit. Mr. Fitzalan Howard thought this was an excellent idea but was concerned with the prospect of vandalism. The trees would probably require some form of protection. The proposal will be discussed at the next Parish Council meeting.

The increase in speeding vehicles (both residents and contractors) in Cathedral Drive was mentioned. The Chairman recommended that, where speed limits are clearly being broken, contact should be made with the police.

# **Updated Information and Matters Arising**

### **Land Management Matters**

**Village Green:** Mr. Gee reported that the storm shelter continues to be vandalised with wood ripped out and set fire to, rails removed and graffiti. This has become a weekly event with regular mending required. Mr. Gee proposed taking the

sides and seats out, together with placing a mushroom shaped object in the centre of the shelter. This was seconded by Mr. Grainger. All in favour.


Cathedral Ruins: The Charles III Coronation seat has been ordered. Unfortunately, the suppliers want full payment in advance and will not move from this position. Mr. Labouchere was against this payment method, a view supported by Mr. Grainger. All members were in agreement and the Chairman will make attempts to locate an alternative provider.

**Broom Green:** Digging in the pond is planned for 26th June.

### Millennium Wood (and Jubilee Wood):

The area has been well cut. A small tree needs to be cut down. A thinning exercise on Jubilee Wood will probably need to be undertaken next year.

**Church Meadow:** Mr. Fitzalan Howard said another plan had been put forward in respect of the church's damp problems. It is the intention to bore holes in random



places but the chances of draining are negligible as the land is solid clay. Costings are being obtained for a pipe in a new trench. Quotations are also to be obtained for improved signs near the Ruins and along Church Lane.

### **Street Lights**

Westcotec has given notice of three months to terminate their involvement with maintenance contracts covering street lights. The effective date will be 1st September, 2023 and, in the meantime, attempts will be made to find an alternative service provider. The Clerk has left a message with K. and M. Lighting Services of St. Ives, Cambridgeshire who already have relationships in this area of the country.

# **Highway Matters**

The cracked manhole on Holt Road has been repaired by Telecoms who have put a temporary cover in place.

### **Pavilion and Playing Field**

At a recent meeting with Mr. Mullany, (North Elmham Walking Football), he confirmed that a split had occurred between North Elmham Football Club and the Walking Football Club. It was acknowledged that CGM are not satisfactorily meeting the terms of the contract and, as a result, the Clerk will contact them with a view to discussing possible termination (breach of clause 13). Mr. Smith mentioned that there was a person in the village prepared to take on the work. It was stressed that the contract should be advertised to give others an opportunity as it was important that best value was obtained. It was agreed by all to pay the first invoice received this year from CGM for £251.50.

### Request for funding from North Elmham PCC

North Elmham Parochial Church Council runs a Church (Community) Larder which requires funding in the region of £3.5K per annum. The Parish Council provides an annual grant to the PCC.

There were mixed views on whether it was appropriate for the Parish Council to make a direct contribution to a Food Bank. It was mentioned that there are longstanding village charities that make donations to those in need. Mr. Smith proposed that the annual NEPCC grant should be increased to £1,200 (previously £1,000) and this was seconded by Mr. Grainger. It would be stressed that this sum should be used for the benefit of parishioners. All members were in favour, except Messrs Fitzalan Howard and Labouchere, who abstained having declared an interest as members of NE Parochial Church Council.

### Report from County/District Councillor

Mr. Bambridge reported that the main focus recently had been on the Call for Sites. There is to be another meeting with George Freeman M.P. at the Memorial Hall on 23rd June. John Hoskins is to contact all local Parish Councils to make sure they are aware of the meeting. About 2,000 objections have been raised so far in respect of Question 13 and the curiously named "Railway Village". Mr. Bambridge said that, following the recent local elections, he is on the Planning Committee but is no longer in the Cabinet.

# Approval for the Annual Governance and Accountability Return

The Clerk presented the Annual Accounts for the year ended 31st March, 2023 which had been circulated to members prior to the meeting. These showed income of £58,948 (£62,095), expenditure of £53,296 (£42,716) and Bank balances of £156,493 (£150,841).

AGAR documentation was presented for consideration, consisting of the Annual Audit Report (completed by Mr. G. Murray), the Annual Governance Statement and the Accounting Statements. Mr. Fitzalan Howard proposed that these be accepted, seconded by Mrs. Keeble, with all in favour. In addition, the Notice of Public Rights will be displayed for thirty working days in June and July

# NORTH ELMHAM WILDLIFE

When is a fly not a fly? The word "fly" has a very specific meaning – it means any insect that belongs to the order Diptera. Insects are divided into several groups, known as orders, and one of those orders is Diptera, the flies. If an insect isn't in Diptera, then whether it's got fly in its name or not, it's not really a fly. One of the defining characteristics of Diptera is that they only have one pair of wings - most other orders of insect have two pairs of wings (although the hindwings can be hidden or very small). This month I'm going to talk about some groups of insects whose names suggest they should be flies but they aren't flies.

There are over 7,000 different species of fly in the UK. By contrast, the order Rhaphidioptera, or snakeflies, has just four British species. They all have an unusually elongated neck which gives the group their name but they're really hard to find as they spend most of their time in the tree canopy. Occasionally, especially on windy days, you might be lucky enough to find one at lower levels but until recently I had not been so fortunate. They've been right at the top of my "most wanted" list and one breezy day recently I went out specifically searching for one, and to my great delight I managed to find one. Just four days later I was out again, this time not in the parish but not far away, and I found a second! They were both the same species, Xanthostigma xanthostigma (photo 1). Snakefly species don't have widely-accepted English names though the author of one recently-published insect book has made some up - he calls this species Small Snakefly. It's not actually all that small by insect standards but is the smallest of the four British snakeflies.

Another tiny order with just four species is Mecoptera, three of which are the scorpionflies. Two of these are common

around North Elmham including *Panorpa communis* which the same author mentioned above calls Common Scorpionfly (photo 2).

There are just three species of alderfly (Megaloptera) in the UK and you're only likely to find one of those, *Sialis lutaria* (or Common Alderfly) in North Elmham (photo 3). They're often seen in spring and early summer, usually close to water. I regularly find them along the railway footpath where it runs alongside a dyke.

Lacewings are a much smaller order compared to flies, but big enough to be split into several families. Of these two are 'flies that aren't flies' - the waxflies and the spongeflies. Spongeflies are small dark brown lacewings. Like alderflies these are usually found near water and there is only one species that you're likely to find in North Elmham, Sisyra nigra or Common Spongefly (photo 4). Waxflies don't really look anything like other lacewings being really tiny and covered in white powdery scales. One species I find regularly, often in numbers, is Coniopteryx tineiformis (photo 5). They're easy to recognise as waxflies but you need a microscope to tell the different species of waxfly apart from one another. Apart from me there's no-one else in Norfolk routinely identifying waxflies, so this means that North Elmham has far more records than anywhere else in the county, including three species that have never been identified anywhere else in Norfolk at all.


One of my favourite groups of insects are mayflies, delicate insects with two or three long tails. Hundreds can emerge all at the same time on a warm spring or summer day but they don't survive as adults for very long. Some species don't even last a whole night and after a particularly big emergence their dead bodies in the morning can cover the surface of water. Such a die-off might sound awful but this is a natural part of their life-cycle – they emerge as adults, moult almost

straight away, mate, lay eggs and die, all in a matter of hours. That's how they're designed – they don't feed as adults because they don't need to. One of the common species is Pond Olive (photo 6).

Another group of flies that aren't flies is the stoneflies. These very elongate insects are usually found close to water. Norfolk isn't the best county for stoneflies as many of them like fast-running rocky rivers and streams but there are a handful of lowland species that live here. I've only found two of them in North Elmham so far including *Nemoura dubitans* (it hasn't got an English name yet) (photo 7).

Caddisflies are elongate brown or blackish insects that can be confused with moths but they're covered in hairs not scales. I've found about 75-80 species in North Elmham so far. Some are tiny (the "micro caddisflies" like *Ithytrichia lamellaris*, photo 8) are 3-4 mm long whereas others (like *Phryganea grandis*, photo 9) are quite big with wingspans of up to about 6 cm. Most caddisflies don't have English names.

Whiteflies are tiny white insects which are in the same group of insects as aphids (some of which are sometimes called greenflies or blackflies). They're in the same order as bugs and leafhoppers among other things. There isn't much information available about how to identify the different species, or even which ones occur in the UK, but I think the one if photo 10 is probably one called Honeysuckle Whitefly. This one was in Bintree Wood, but most of the whiteflies I see are on kale that my wife brings home from the allotment.

Barkflies are another group of poorly-recorded species. They are in the same order as lice (including headlice) but most of them are winged and look quite different from the lice that make our scalps itch. One attractive species that is very common in North Elmham is *Graphopsocus cruciatus* (photo 11), recently dubbed "Blotched Barklouse".

The order Hymenoptera includes bees, wasps, ants and, more relevant for this piece, sawflies. Hymenoptera is probably the biggest and most diverse group of animals in the world, though based on the species known to science that position is topped by beetles with a whopping 400,000 different species described – a quarter of all known animal species on the planet. Sawflies are pretty diverse, some being confusable with wasps (but never with a narrow waist) and others looking more like flies. The first sawfly I photographed was at Bawdeswell Heath in 2014 (photo 12) and I didn't identify it until recently when I was going through my sawfly records for a friend who was doing a review of the status and distribution of all the sawflies in the UK. It was a species called Arge metallica, known in the literature as Irish - not British. My friend has now unearthed five old British records but none since 1927. Mine was, in his words, as "rare as rocking horse poops". There are some very similar species that you're more likely to find in North Elmham.

I can think of three more types of "flies that aren't flies", but I don't think anyone would confuse these with true flies: dragonflies, damselflies (which are dainty dragonflies) and of course butterflies.

Do get in touch if you have seen any wildlife in North Elmham – I enjoy hearing your news. This month Janice got in touch about a Sparrowhawk in her garden which reminded me of one that I saw in my garden recently (photo 13). Even better, George and Ann Keeble saw a bird on their garden feeder that turned out to be a Serin. Similar to Siskin, Serin is a small yellow finch that is very common in southern Europe but is a rare visitor to the UK. One or two get seen in Norfolk most years, but usually at the coast so finding one in North Elmham is amazing! Thankfully George got a photo (photo 14) which nicely documents this rare migrant. It was only seen very briefly - I





wonder if it visited anyone else's garden? Let me know if you saw it, or if you have anything interesting to share (email appleton.dave@googlemail.com, phone 668431 or message me via Twitter at @ ElmhamMeadows).

FREE ENTRY WITH RETIRING COLLECTION

We have noticed over the last couple of years that some graves are hampering maintenance and mowing and would like to remind people of some key points in the Diocesan Regulations:

- Kerbs, railings, fencing and chippings are prohibited.
- Objects such as statues, toys, wind chimes, windmills, photographs and candles are also prohibited. These will be removed and the family advised either directly or by a notice on the grave, including how to arrange collection.
- Bulbs and small annual plants can be planted in the soil of the grave (directly, or in a removable sunken container). It is the family's responsibility to keep this tidy and the PCC retains the right to mow over any planting that becomes unsightly.

Wreaths or cut flowers may be laid direct on any grave or in any vase incorporated into the base of the memorial. The PCC will remove any wilted flowers and wreaths (e.g. Christmas) once they become unsightly.

No artificial flowers – other than "silk" flowers, i.e. polyester/cotton mixture. The PCC retains the right to remove other artificial flowers without notice.

 Finally, the maintenance of the memorial is the responsibility of the family. Occasionally, graves sink, which may cause the memorial to lean. The PCC has no responsibility over these matters, or indeed, storm or other damage.

These Regulations may sound prohibitive, but they are in place to ensure that our churchyards continue to be beautiful places of peace and solace for generations to come.



Dear friends

I am writing this letter, sitting outside my motorhome on a campsite in the Lake District experiencing a totally different landscape to that of Norfolk. Magnificent mountains surround me, and I am reminded of the wonders of the natural world and creation. From the Genesis creation it should be noted that humankind was the last of God's creations, following all the other creatures that we share this world with, as if we might just have been an afterthought. If so perhaps he might be regretting this afterthought!

God gave us dominion over the natural world not for us to exploit all its riches, but to be shepherds of all creation.

I am currently reading "Silent Earth" by Dave Goulsen. It is a treatise on the decline of the insect population around us. Those of us who are older may remember that in days gone by, at the end of a car journey, our windscreens and number plates needed to be cleared of insects, something not so prevalent now.

Some might say so what, but we have to remember that many insects play a vital part in the web of life. They act as pollinators not just of flowers but also of many of the plants that feed us. It is our actions, such as the use of neo-nicotinoids, that are contributing to a rapid fall not just in numbers but also in species. In his book, Goulsen quote the biologist E. O. I hope you will be able to enjoy a wonderful summer and all its glory but please remember we are part of the natural world not its masters. We need to tread lightly on this earth considering the words of Jesus, "consider the flowers in the fields and the birds of the air" and pass on what is normal to us to our children and our children's children.


