GARDENING CLUB

At the last meeting Thursday 24th March, Trevor Nash, who was accompanied by his wife, gave a fascinating talk with slides, on Bee Keeping. Trevor is the Chairman of the Norfolk Beekeeping Association. He explained the origin of the Honeybee which had been here in Norfolk for 130M years. There are 250 species of the Honeybee and 25 species of the Bumble Bee. The Honeybees are the only bees that have evolved into social colonies and live through the winter months. Not all bees sting, as the male bee's anatomy does not allow him to sting, so only females do.

The honeybees only sting when threatened and the Worker bees feel their hive, which contains their Queen, has to be protected, and can be aggressive. Therefore, bees require calm confident handling.

Unfortunately, after using their sting, the Honeybee dies, which isn't good for honey production. The person said to be the Father of Bee keeping was Rev. Lorenzo Longstroth 1810-1895 USA who invented and patented the modern day Longstroth Hive.

As the Norfolk Bee Keeping Association information states, today bee keeping is a complex diverse activity of interest

to many for honey production and sale and as a hobby working with and understanding a fascinating animal and can provide many rewards and enjoyment including studying natural history, for little time and money.

Thank you, Trevor, for an interesting evening and talk and for bringing honey with you.

£100 was raised after his talk by the raffle, sale of plants and books which has been donated via The Teapost to the Emergency Disaster Fund for Ukraine.

The next meeting of the Club on Thursday 26th May will be in the Memorial Hall at 7.30pm when Derek Edwards will delight us with a talk on Medieval Aerial Archaeology.

There will be the Flower of the Month and a raffle. Refreshments will be available (gentle reminder to Heather and June).

NORTH ELMHAM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

WEDNESDAY 2ND MARCH, 2022

The following information is taken from the Draft PC minutes and may be expanded where the Editors feel more explanation is necessary. The full official minutes can be viewed in the Post Office and on the Community website, once approved.

Councillors Present Were:

Mrs. J. Borgnis (Chairman), Mr. M. Phillips, Mr. T. Fitzalan Howard, Mr. B. Gee, Mr. P. Grainger, Mrs. A. Keeble, Mr. J. Labouchere, Mr. N. Markwell, Mr. M. Rayner and Mr. C. Smith

Also in Attendance: Mr. K. Webb (Clerk), Mr. G. Bambridge (District Councillor) and five parishioners.

Apologies for absence: Miss A. Ferris

Public Participation

A parishioner expressed a desire to buy some parish land, (approximately 11 acres), in the northern part of the village, having recently submitted a letter giving details. It would be the intention to keep some cattle on the field from July to October. Advice was given that requests of this nature are given full consideration by the members of the Parish Council.

A view was expressed that the village needs a good clean as there are areas where there are piles of leaves and debris. A number of drains are blocked by leaves. This situation is the responsibility of Norfolk County Council, Highways and Mr. Grainger advised that five issues have previously been logged but are still outstanding. There had been some response in November following help given by our County Councillor. Unfortunately, paint on the road identifying areas to be tackled had been washed away by rain. Mr. Labouchere reported that, following an inspection carried out by Paul George, Operations

Manager of Norfolk Rivers Drainage Board, Water Management Alliance, it was clear that many gullies had not been properly cleared. The matter is due to be discussed later in the meeting.

It was reported that a senior lady had been terrified by some young boys who had been throwing things into her garden. It was stressed that issues of this kind need to be reported to the police. Mr. Smith is to speak with the Police Liaison Officer.

A parishioner had sent in a letter expressing concern that a low flying drone had been passing over and near to his property. He had reported the matter to the police.

Land Management Matters

Village Green: Mr. Gee produced two very impressive plaques (total cost £276) which are to be attached to wooden boards. The tree planted last year has been decimated by vandals. The matter has been reported to the police. A tree in Cedar Close bordering the village green needs to be cut back. The owner of the property is to obtain a quotation for the work with the intention being for the Parish Council to pay 50% of the cost.

Cathedral Meadows: Mr. Fitzalan Howard said that the brash has been burnt and the ash will be taken away. The hedges on either side of the lane have been cut.

Millennium Wood and Jubilee

Wood: According to a parishioner, the mechanism on the gate to Jubilee Wood is broken. The Chairman will inspect.

Prince William Wood: The springs have come off the gate to the road. Mr. Labouchere felt that self centering hinges, relying on gravity, would provide a better option. Mr. Markwell will speak to Ben Darby regarding this matter. A parishioner had said that some fences were broken which meant that the wood was no longer a secure enclosure. Mr. Markwell will inspect but it was stressed that the Parish Council is only responsible for those fences that it has erected.

Street Lights

Mr. Markwell reported that light 31, which is situated outside 29 Eastgate Street, is going to be discussed by the letting agent and the owner of the property. Light 76 in Wensum Drive is now working. There is no power to the pole in Pump Street. U. K. Power Networks is to be contacted by Westcotec.

Highway Matters

There has been no progress regarding a number of issues which were reported in November, 2021 and on which assurances were given. Mr. Grainger is to write again on this matter with copies going to the Highways Supervisor and Mr. Borrett (County Councillor).

Pavilion and Playing Field

A number of jobs are in the pipeline. It is understood that the Football Club wants to return to the village and wish to attend the next meeting of the Parish Council with a view to doing a presentation. Mrs. Keeble has contacted Mr. Duffield about the large pothole in the car park. The Tennis Club plans to resurface in the week beginning

13th March. The basketball hoop is to be moved to the top of the field.

Youth Club Facilities

Proposals are to be submitted at the next meeting. Mr. Fitzalan Howard said that he was concerned with the prospect of spending money on items which could be vandalised.

Eastgate Centre

The AGM was held last week. The annual grant from the Parish Council will not be requested this year as funds have been received in the form of Covid grants. A new Girl Guides group is using the facility.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee in 2022

It may be possible to get another band. The Chairman is to investigate.

Defibrillators

Mr. Smith reported that the Institute Committee is considering the possibility of acquiring a defibrillator and the Football Club may also wish to have one at the Pavilion.

Affordable Housing

Mr. Rayner said that there has been no recent contact from Broadland Housing.

Improvements to the Frontage of North Elmham School

The Federation has obtained quotations for the proposed work, the most favourable being for £699 + VAT. Mr. Smith proposed that the Parish Council make a 50% contribution to the cost, i.e. £349.50, and this was seconded by Mr. Grainger. All in favour.

Millennium Wood Bench

The Chairman suggested that the additional bench be in the form of a raised timber seat and will duly investigate options.

Community Plaque

Mr. Fitzalan Howard said that the oak board on which the plaque presented in respect of the community response to the pandemic is to be placed has been cut and shaped. It is to be oiled.

District and/or Council Councillors' Reports

Mr. Bambridge confirmed that bin collection dates and times will be changing for some people. Help is being given to those who are experiencing problems with paying Council Tax. Breckland Council will be calling for sites in respect of the Local Plan. A new accommodation block is being opened in Thetford. A shop has also been opened in Thetford selling cheap food obtained from supermarkets. A bus is to travel around the area and one of the weekly stops is to be in North Elmham. The District Council has a net carbon zero target (without buying credits) by 2023. Grants are still available for the forthcoming Jubilee. There are bursaries of up to £500 with about twenty remaining.

Mid Norfolk Railway – Transfer Deed, Footpath and Other Matters

A meeting was held at Breckland Council on this day attended by the Chairman, Mr. Rayner and Mr. Markwell (Parish Council), Mr. Robinson (Chairman) and the Finance Director (Mid Norfolk Railway) and Ralph Burton, Zoe Footer and Gordon Bambridge (Breckland Council). It was considered to be a generally positive meeting and minutes are to be written and issued. Both Breckland and the MNR agreed that the footpath is not permissive and there is no intention to change the status. Wording in an agreement would need to be included to allow them to close temporarily for maintenance or emergency reasons. This is all subject to agreement by the MNR board. An assurance was given that there would be no further development north of the point in the transfer deed in respect of the Miniature Railway. It was mentioned that the recent tree felling did not need consent as it was either covered by a Works Order or is not in the Conservation Area.

Eastgate Street Drains

Messrs Labouchere and Phillips met Paul George, the Area Manager of the Inland Drainage Board, on 4th February to look at the problem. Eight gullies were measured and there is a lot of silt in them which is being taken towards Eastgate Street. A quotation had been obtained to carry out necessary work - £3,315 plus £700 to cut the hedge where there is no ditch. It was acknowledged that mud is coming from the Brisley Road and is blocking the drains. The gullies need to be cleared on a regular basis. Mr. Smith proposed that the hedge should be cut, the ditch cleared and Highways Department requested to flush out the gullies. All in favour.

Breckland Council's New Commercial Waste Service

Breckland has started a new commercial waste service which appears to be competitive regarding price. The Parish

Council is served by Biffa and the position will be assessed prior to August when the current contract is due for review.

Storm Damage to Property Bordering the Village Green

An email has been received from a parishioner stating that during the recent strong winds some damage to the boundary fencing has occurred as a result of bushes on the village green being blown over on to them. Two boundary fences have been damaged beyond repair and a request has been made for the Parish Council to make a contribution towards replacements. It was agreed by all, in principle, to make a payment of 50% towards the reasonable cost of two new panels.

It was agreed to carry this matter forward to the next meeting.

This matter will be drawn to the attention of the District Council.

It was with great pleasure that I read your article headed "Cricket Mid Norfolk Village Shield Success".

The inscription on the shield says that it was first presented to the "Norfolk County Cricket Club by a few subscribers for the encouragement of village cricket in Mid Norfolk, 7th January 1904".

North Elmham won this shield five times before WW1 including on the eve of war in 1914. They won it again six times between WW1 & WW2. The last time North Elmham won the Shield was in 1948. I am not sure who their main opposition was but the balance of probability suggests it was Rougham.

In 1908 the North Elmham captain was Dr Rackham, whose picture is on the wall of the village surgery.

The man who presented the shield was Mr William Lewis Boyle who was the Liberal MP for Mid Norfolk. His maternal grandfather was General Sir Lorenzo Moore CB, who fought and won a duel on Wimbledon Common on 13th February 1832. His opponent, Miles Stapleton, who later became Lord Beaumont, was wounded but recovered and did not pursue the matter any further. The General was arrested and confined at Kingston and was released against a recognisance of £4,000 provided by a friend, John Gideon Millingen.

The shield itself is still keenly competed every year since, with the only exception being the war years and the recent pandemic. In 2021 it was won by Swaffham.

NORTH ELMHAM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

WEDNESDAY 6TH APRIL 2022

The following information is taken from the Draft PC minutes and may be expanded where the Editors feel more explanation is necessary. The full official minutes can be viewed in the Post Office and on the Community website, once approved.

Councillors Present Were

Mrs. J. Borgnis (Chairman), Mr. M. Phillips, Miss A. Ferris, Mr. T. Fitzalan Howard, Mr. B. Gee, Mr. P. Grainger, Mrs. A. Keeble, Mr. J. Labouchere, Mr. N. Markwell, Mr. M. Rayner and Mr. C. Smith

Also in Attendance: Mr. K. Webb (Clerk), P. C. Benton (Dereham Police), two representatives from North Elmham F.C. and two parishioners.

Public Participation

Chris Reeve from North Elmham Football Club, accompanied by the Club Manager, Luke, gave a summary of the Club's formation two years ago and the current position. The progress made over a relatively short period of time has been spectacular and they have men's and ladies' teams, a walking football side and a large, thriving junior section. Games in the current season have been played at Billingford but there is a strong desire to return to North Elmham. An ambition exists to improve facilities in general with proposed work to be done on the changing rooms (e.g. redecorating). It was mentioned that 80% of the junior players live in North Elmham. The members will discuss the situation at the next meeting but there is a positive intent to support the Club's growth and improvement aims.

Mr. Howell stated that he wished to talk about the Stewardship Scheme and that he was proud to be a farmer. He said that Scheme rules were not being met by the Parish Council and, as a result, he had lodged a complaint with DEFRA. Mr. Fitzalan Howard stressed to Mr. Howell, and attempted to reassure him, that all rules had been followed to the letter. Mr. Howell also questioned why he had heard nothing regarding his offer to provide land under the affordable housing call for sites process. Mr. Rayner explained that this was being handled by Broadland Housing and, as such, all submissions have to be made to them. To date, the Parish Council has not received a report from the Housing Association.

Police Visit

The members were pleased to welcome P.C. Roger Benton, Beat Manager from Dereham who stressed the importance of reporting all incidents to the police. There is a team providing high visibility policing. SNAP meetings take place every three months at the Breckland Offices with the next one on 13th April. Key area

issues at the moment include anti-social cycling and speeding on Norwich Road, Dereham. Mention was also made of the Streetsafe scheme where particular places or locations of concern can be reported on the police website.

In the period from 1/1/22 to 3/4/22, North Elmham has had a total of eighteen crimes which have been reported. When compared to other villages of a similar size, this figure is considered, in the main, to be on the low side. The importance of reporting all incidents in person, online or by telephone was emphasised however. Mr. Fitzalan Howard asked about drug problems and P.C. Benton was unaware of any specific issues in the village although there have been major problems with county line gangs in Norwich.

Mr. Grainger stated that our SAM data shows 4,000 speeding incidents per month in the village and there has been a concern for some time that the police will not make any use of this information. P. C. Benton has asked for details to be forwarded to him. He will forward the data to the appropriate person (Safety Camera Team) and report back.

Mr. Labouchere expressed his concerns regarding e-scooters. Individuals have to have a driving licence (provisional or full) to rent the equipment through authorised companies. Personal e-scooters can only be used on private land. The equipment can be seized if conditions of use are not fulfilled.

Land Management Matters

Village Green: The boundary fencing on the property bordering the village green has been replaced (see previous minutes) but Mr. Gee reported that a slope has resulted which could be dangerous. He has, therefore, partially filled it in to reduce the risk. A bicycle and chair appeared next to the bin on the green. The bicycle eventually disappeared but the chair remained, only to be broken up at a later date.

Millennium Wood (and Jubilee Wood):

The Chairman has inspected the gate to Jubilee Wood and is of the opinion that no action is needed. Darren Brown is dealing with the installation of the new bench and Julian Duffield is to handle arrangements for the other seat.

Bridleway on disused railway line and other railway linked matters: The board of the Mid Norfolk Railway confirmed the agreement made at the meeting held at Breckland Council offices. Mr. Rayner is to chase a copy of the written agreement.

Prince William Wood: Mr. Markwell confirmed that new springs for the gate to the road have been successfully fitted and the gate is working well. He has looked for gaps in the fence but has been unable to find any. Flagship Housing has said that the residents are responsible for maintaining the yellow cross hatching outside the gate although this is open to debate.

Street Lights

Mr. Markwell reported that light 31, which is situated outside 29 Eastgate Street, has not yet been discussed as the letting agent has been unable to make contact with the owner of the property. A report on the position with the Pump Street light is awaited.

Highway Matters

Mr. Grainger reported that there had been much recent activity in Holt Road. Work on dressing the surface will commence on 11th May with road markings to be done on 25th May. The only item still outstanding is the cycleway across the Village Green. It was noted that the road at Pump Street had started to break up near the telephone box. It had been reported as "done" by the County Council but the matter has not yet been resolved.

Pavilion and Playing Field

All outstanding jobs have been completed. The Football Club plans to return to the village (please see "Public Participation" above). The Cricket Club has left a number

of items behind but has taken the white line marker which is thought to be the property of the Parish Council. The Clerk is to write to the Chairman to ask for all equipment to be removed from the pavilion and behind the bus shelter. In addition, a request is to be made for the return of keys to the pavilion and the white line marker by the end of April.

The tennis club has finished resurfacing. The large pothole in the car park has been filled in. The basketball hoop has been positioned at the top of the field. The kickwall has been repaired but improvements will need to be made to it next year. The Clerk is to send annual invoices to the Tennis Club and Bowls Club.

Eastgate Centre

A broken window has been reported.

Brookside Development Update

Electric vehicle charging points will be installed.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee in 2022

A meeting is to be held next week. It is the intention is to have two bands and there will be a fete.

Affordable Housing

An update has been requested from Broadland Housing.

Millennium Wood Bench

This matter is proceeding as planned.

Eastgate Street Drains

The suction team from the County Council had visited and eight blocked gullies had been tackled. Unfortunately, two were not done correctly and a return trip was needed. The position is to be monitored over the next six months. The decision on whether to cut down trees or reducing the height of them will be considered at that time.

Update on Village Facilities

Mr. Fitzalan Howard detailed the key items which included a BMX track (not

enough land), basketball hoop, skate park, outdoor gym and outdoor tennis table. Decisions will be made on whether or not funds are to be spent to provide any of these facilities. Mr. Grainger mentioned that he had had a conversation with Active Norfolk. Breckland Council are due to appoint someone who will have specific responsibility for Breckland villages. In particular, they will be looking to concentrate on particular locations where there are gaps in facilities. There is now a basketball hoop on the playing field

The Situation in Ukraine

The Chairman wondered if there was something that could be done on a community basis. Mr. Gee mentioned that Brisley were planning to hold a fund raising function. On balance, it was agreed not to take any action at the current time.

Breckland Mobile Store Project

A communication had been received from Sophie Soto, Early Intervention Officer at Breckland Council. They are preparing to launch a new project, the Breckland Mobile Food Store and the village has been identified as a location on the proposed route. The project has been developed in response to rising household costs and the need for more affordable and and healthy food options, plus access to wider support services to help address issues residents are experiencing. It was felt that the Church larder (free) and the local shop were already doing good jobs and, as such, this new service was not needed at present.

Finance

Mr. Phillips presented the Management Financial Report for the year ended 31/3/22 which showed income of £59.1K and expenditure of £39.5K. Allowing for the difficulties caused by the pandemic, particularly in respect of the delay to and cancellation of certain work and projects, these figures were broadly in line with expectations.

CRICKET IN THE 50'S

Found in a scrapbook from the early 1950's.

Cricketers All North Elmham Can Be Proud Of Its Record.

In a village which has won the Mid Norfolk Shield more than twice the number of times of any other village in the League, you can expect to find more than the usual percentage of cricketing enthusiasts. As it is, in North Elmham the difficulty is to find any man over 40 who has not played for the village at some time or other. Get a few old timers together and you will hear countless yarns of sixes dropping onto the Kings Head bowling green and fierce struggles with the neighbouring clubs – in those days – at Billingford and Swanton Morley.

How did Elmham win the shield ten times? Mr Dick Hewett who was playing cricket at the turn of the century and captained the 1st X1 for ten years, can give the answer. 'It was training that did it' he claims. 'Old Tom Case – one of Elmham's most famous captains – who died recently at the age of 80 had us boys out on the Green Field every night of the week. We had two nets, and each man had ten minutes with the bat. We got so many along that we didn't have time to give everyone a turn. That gives you an idea of how keen we were in those days.

Nowadays says Mr Hewett, you see a cricketer on the field during the week. If they get a good ball as soon as they go in on Saturday, that's their batting finished for another seven days. A village this size should be able to produce a first class team. The spirit of the game has improved since the old days, and that's a good thing but the youngsters are not as keen as they were' he claims'

His opinion is shared by many of the old villagers who turned out for Elmham in the days when every match, as Mr Hewett puts it, was treated like a Yorkshire – Lancashire battle. There is little Ben Reeve, well known in most of the villages in Mid Norfolk, and in Dereham as well, as a cricketer, a footballer and a runner before the first World War. There is Mr Olly Smith, one of the most useful players Elmham has had. There is Mr J. Bradfield, the village butcher who captained the Reserves when the late Mr Frank Kerrison, then the village grocer, captained the first X1.

Mr Bradfield tells the story of how the Reserves challenged Billingford about 34 years ago, after they had beaten Elmham's

senior team four times that season and how they scored 30 and then dismissed Billingford for less than 20. A providential Thunderstorm prevented Billingford getting their revenge in a second innings, and an exultant Reserves team made the 1st X1 members' lives miserable for months afterwards

And there is Mr Bertie Marsh, another stalwart of the early days, whose family has been carrying on Elmham's cricketing tradition ever since. His two sons George and Fred, have given years of service to the club and their cousin John is another regular player.

Mr George Marsh was either Captain or Secretary or both from 1931 to 1947. During that time he collected a host of medals and set up records which are still unbeaten. Playing against Swanton Morley on the Green Field in one hour and five minutes he scored 99 runs. And in a Fisher Cup final against Bircham, against a bowler who was reckoned to be 'Unplayable' he scored 32 runs in the first over.

His brother Fred still turns out for the Club but his finest performances were at Dereham when he bowled regularly for the Town. On his mantelpiece at home is a clock presented to him in 1946 for taking 117 wickets in the season for an average of 8.6 runs each. His pace has slowed a little at the age of 39, and a leg injury has been causing him trouble, but he was still able to take two wickets in last week's Fisher Cup final.

Throughout the years the cricket centre of Elmham has been the Green Field, a piece of land which the Parish Council bought in 1913. Only recently was it discovered when plans were discussed at a parish meeting to improve it, that according to the terms of the Smallholdings and Allotments Act of 1908, it was illegal for football or cricket to be played on it.

For many years, therefore Elmham Cricket Club has been unwittingly breaking the law. The players will be relieved to hear that this week the Parish Council was notified that the land had been transferred to another Act which makes games legal. A committee headed by Mr George Marsh is going ahead with arrangements for a bulldozer to level the field, and by next season the club should have a first –class ground. Perhaps if the spirit of the old days can be revived it will have a first class team as well.

NORTH ELMHAM WILDLIFE

During the last couple of days the warm southerly airflow has brought a flurry of migrant birds to mid Norfolk. There was a Pied Flycatcher in Reepham, 4 Wheatears at Brisley, Ring Ouzels at a few places and a Redstart or two - and I was stuck indoors working, missing out on all of the action! Hopefully by the time you read this I'll have been able to get out and find birds of this quality here in North Elmham. Earlier on I had enjoyed my first Willow Warblers of the year, one singing from a Birch tree off Great Heath Road followed by one in a neighbour's garden audible from my bedroom. Their song is a beautiful descending warble, but sadly this is a species in decline and we don't hear it anywhere near as often as we did a couple of decades ago.

The Shelduck (photo) isn't usually thought of as a summer visitor as they are present in the county all year, but round here they are rarely seen in winter, arriving in March to breed in small numbers. They are a large and distinctive duck, mostly white but with blocks of dark green, chestnut and black, a bright red bill and pink legs. The only duck that is a true summer visitor, normally absent from the country in winter, is the Garganey. They're pretty scarce usually but it's been a good spring for them. I found a couple of drakes on the pool by Bintree Mill recently.

Resident birds are often easiest to find in the spring as males belt out their songs to mark their territory. The Yellowhammer (photo), a declining farmland bird, is still holding on around our parish. I'm not quite so keen on the wheezy song of the Greenfinch (photo) but I'm pleased to be seeing and hearing them again as they're population seems to be recovering a little. They used to be really common and familiar garden birds until 2006 when they, along with Chaffinches, were hit by a disease called Trichomonosis. Previously

this disease had been largely restricted to cage birds and to pigeons and doves, but rapidly spread among our wild finches, through contaminated garden bird feeders and water baths. Regularly cleaning feeders seems to help and now at last these finches seem to be increasing again. During the winter I'd seen the largest flock of Greenfinches that I'd seen for years, at least 50 birds strong.

Our vitally important pollinating insects become much more evident in spring as nectar-laden flowers start to bloom. I've written before about the importance of dandelions for our insects, especially in spring. They're great plants to have growing in your lawns or between the cracks in your paving – please don't rush to get the weedkiller out - enjoy them and the bees and other insects that feed on them! Another spring flower that the bees love is Ground Ivy (photo). The garden variety of Yellow Archangel is a mixed blessing. It escapes into the wild and in some places it out-completes the natural wild Yellow Archangel (which doesn't have the variegated leaves of the garden variety) and is a threat to that wildflower's survival. But it is also enjoyed by the insects like the Common Carder Bee (photo). Different types of bee seem to prefer different flowers and this year I've noticed Hairy-footed Flower Bees at comfreys. The buff-bodied males have fringes of long hair on their feet but the females (photo) are largely black insects, with an orange pollen brush on their hind legs (which looks white when it's covered in comfrey pollen as in my photo). Some of the mining bees can be really hard to identify but one that is easy to recognise is the female Tawny Mining Bee, rich reddish-brown behind the head and orange behind (photo) – I don't see many of them but one place I've seen them repeatedly is the field around the chapel ruins.

Not a bee, the Dark-edged Bee-fly looks a bit like a bee with long straight mouthparts protruding out in front of it as it hovers at flowers or rests on dead leaves in the sunshine (photo). They're a delight to watch on sunny days in early spring, frequenting gardens as well as the countryside. It's currently the only species of bee-fly in Norfolk but the southern Dotted Bee-fly is worth looking out for. It is expanding its range northwards and is expected to colonise here soon. Look at the wings – solid dark at the front on Dark-edged Bee-fly but as the name suggests, dotted on Dotted Bee-fly.

I love seeing the first butterflies appearing in spring. One that has just started to appear is the Speckled Wood (photo), a species whose fortunes have changed over the years. Once common and widespread it declined greatly in the nineteenth century before starting to recover again in the twentieth century. It became re-established in the Brecks in the 50s but remained rare elsewhere in the county for a while longer. Now once again it is found commonly pretty much throughout Norfolk.

It has been said that butterflies are just moths with better PR, and there's a lot of truth in that. They are biologically the same group, in fact most recent research places butterflies as a clade within the larger group of moths. Moths certainly have the advantage of diversity - you'd have to try really hard to see 40 different species of butterfly in Norfolk in a lifetime whereas I've seen 973 different species of moth in North Elmham alone in just 7-8 years. One of my favourites at this time of year is the Muslin Moth. Looking at them from above they have grey-brown wings with black spots and a hairy body, but looking at them from the front they look guite a character with yellowy-orange hair and big feathery antennae (photo).





There's always plenty of interesting wildlife to see around the village. Milly got in touch with a photo of some Common Lizards she and her son George had found in her garden. I've not seen lizards here before so it was great to hear they're around locally. NORFOLK HONEY CAKE

2oz (50g) butter 5oz (125g) clear honey 5oz (125g) demerara sugar 10oz (300g) plain flour Pinch of salt

1 teaspoon of bicarbonate of soda

1 teaspoon ground mixed spice

1 teaspoon ground ginger

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

4oz (100g) chopped mixed peel

1 egg

1/4pint (150ml) milk 1oz (25g) flaked almonds

Grease a 1lb (450g) loaf tin. Preheat oven to 180C/350F/Gas MK4.

Melt the butter over low heat. Take off the heat and stir in honey and sugar. Mix well and leave until lukewarm. Sift together flour, salt, bicarbonate of soda, spice, ginger and cinnamon and stir in the peel. Beat the egg and milk together and add to the honey. Pour liquid into the flour and beat until smooth. Pour into prepared tin and scatter almonds over the top. Bake 1¼ hours. Cool in the time for 5mins and turn out onto a wire rack to cool. Serve sliced and buttered. (Naughty but nice!).



The group that started in Fen Hide managed to see Golden Plover, Marsh Harrier and Common Crane, although those following only managed Greylag, Coot and Moorhen. Five Snipe flew over their heads as they arrived at the hide.

After lunch the group made their way to Buckenham Marsh, seeing a field full of Fieldfares and a Mistle Thrush on the way. At Buckenham all seemed very quiet initially, but eventually four large flocks of Wigeon flew in, looking spectacular in the sunshine. They joined the dozen or so of Chinese Water Deer that were grazing on the marsh. A Great Egret flew over, and Teal. Oystercatcher and many Lapwings were seen. There were notably lots of Rooks around, indicating that the Rook roost at dusk might be interesting, but members were too tired to stay on for that. One group did walk around to the old windpump, from which they saw Pintail, Ruff and a Red Kite but even these were defeated by the biting wind and long wait in prospect.

Our first indoor meeting in person this year included a talk by Carl Chapman entitled Birds by Habitat, in which he showcased many of his beautiful photographs. We were sorry that the turnout was low, affected by the recent upsurge in Covid cases, but those of us who made it very much enjoyed the talk and the chance to



A TALE OF TWO TAILORS

During the last century there was a Doctor Barnardo's home at County School, on top of the hill. It was for destitute boys and most of them joined the Royal Navy or Merchant Navy when they became 14.

The school provided jobs for many local people, and I think the village was proud of the home and the boys. The school had a wonderful band, much sought after for local functions when the lads would arrive in their best uniforms. Seeing these boys in their smart uniforms has given me a lifelong love affair with military uniforms, aren't they great!

I have been given some family history by Gerald Hawkins about his grandfather who worked at County School as a tailor. His name was William Wilton.

This was written by an old boy of the school, called Tony Halson.

" Hello, I was at Watts Naval Training School from the summer of 1941 to 1944. I well remember 'Doggy Wilton', the tailor, and also 'Crabby Runcie', both of whom kept us all in a tidy fashion, one way or another. I have to presume that the 'nicknames' attributed to both before I arrived at the school, were as a result of their walking difficulties. Both had trouble with their walking. Mr Wilton probably was the least able. Every member of staff had a nickname, usually in recognition of some outstanding feature or trait. So did most of the boys, to some extent they do still.

I was never sure what the relationship was between the two of them. Both worked in the tailor's shop, yet, Mr Runcie wore the uniform of a Watts Instructor Officer, Mr Wilton was a 'civilian'. Both arrived at the school in the morning in what were termed Invalid carriages: black, three wheeled tricycles, driven by a small petrol engine at the back, and steered by a long handlebar at the front wheel. Mr Runcie parked some way from the tailor's shop and walked with the aid of walking sticks. Mr Wilton parked nearby and made the best way he could into the shop.

On first joining the school, one was kitted out in junior sailor's uniform. There was a stack of various sizes, and the nearest fit was adjusted to suit, always bearing in mind that 11 year old boys are going to grow. What a proud day! A sailor at last, even though one's feet were not yet wet.

Repairs were inevitable, but not necessary according to Mr Wilton. We each had two suits, No 1's were best and No 2's were the workaday suit. Mr Wilton expected the No 2's to last for ever so that he did not have to make a new No 1, the existing No 1 becoming No 2.

Rips and 'Fair wear and tear' was not in the vocabulary . I don't recall anyone having a new suit because they grew out of the one they had. I think the First Lieutenant and the tailor should have co-operated more. The former insisted on suits being brushed and cleaned to

the extent that they must have been threadbare before their time. The tailor never recognised the cause and reckoned that the boys had been careless.

I remember that Mr Wilton sat, in true tailor's style, cross legged, on the workbench, immediately opposite the door. One was always met with his disapproving glare over the top of his glasses as one entered the tailor's shop. Not surprisingly, considering that the only reason for a visit to his workplace meant more work for him.

He was quite capable of 'tearing one off a strip' if he believed that damage to one's uniform should have been avoided, which he usually did, but boys of that age, being what they are,' a pinch of salt' comes to mind! "

I'm sorry there is not another page to go with this.

Very sadly Mr Wilton died aged only 62. He and his family lived in Eastgate Street and he had been a member of staff at Watts for 4 1/2 years. Always a keen follower of village sport, he had for many years acted as umpire for the North Elmham Cricket club.

His coffin was borne to the church on a gun carriage drawn by boys from the school and four members of staff.

If you turn left (you are now on Greatheath Road) then in about 500 yards there is a turn on the left on to another public footpath. You will pass some houses on your right.

Follow the track as it bends to the left and then turn left on to the way marked path in to the woodland. Follow this path as it winds through the trees and you will end back up on the the wider public path which takes you back to Pump Street and the car park.


