WEDNESDAY 7TH JULY

Councillors Present:Mr. M. Phillips, (acting Chairman), Mr. B. Gee, Miss A. Ferris, Mr. T. Fitzalan Howard, Mr. P. Grainger, Mrs. A. Keeble, Mr. J. Labouchere, Mr. M. Rayner, Mr. C. Smith.

Also in Attendance: Mr. K. Webb (Clerk).

Apologies: Mrs. J. Borgnis, Mr. N. Markwell

Public Participation

None

Land Management Matters

Village Green: An electronic version of the RoSPA report has been received; hard copies are to follow. In the meantime, any urgent matters will be addressed. The report is to be fully discussed at the next meeting. There has been more vandalism. A person tried to pull up the fence and was confronted by a parishioner who immediately became the recipient of abuse. It was suggested that CCTV cameras should be installed and appropriate notices erected. This is also to be discussed at the next meeting. The hedges are to be cut at some stage. Mr. Phillips is to look into this matter.

Cathedral Ruins: Mrs. Keeble said that the slopes are due to be cut but the specialist remote control machine is currently out of action.

Cathedral Meadows: Mr. Fitzalan Howard reported that the derogation to burn the brash has not yet been received. Brown and Co have authority to deal with matters but it was considered appropriate for them to have access to the records. A parishioner has suggested having a small area for wildlife and flora, ten metres

wide, at the far end of the middle field. A small notice is to be put up advising people of this. All agreed that this was an excellent idea

Broom Green: Mr. Labouchere confirmed that work has been completed.

Bridleway on disused railway line and other railway linked matters: Mr. Rayner has sent a holding reply to Norfolk County Council.

Prince William Wood: Mr. Markwell had received a number of queries from a parishioner. Matters raised will be considered and action taken where necessary.

Allotments: Mr. Phillips said that there is currently a waiting list of people wanting an allotment.

Highway Matters

Mr. Grainger reported that there had been no update on the outstanding matters. The Clerk will chase Linda McDermott, the County Programme Engineer for Norfolk County Council. Miss Ferris said that the vegetation along Station Road towards Worthing is overgrown and has started to cover the pavement. The volunteers are to be asked to attend to this. The road near the Brookside development is in need of repair and has been reported to Highways who have been out to inspect.

Pavilion and Playing Field

The RoSPA report has been received with some items due to be dealt with in the near future. The new loft ladder is being installed tomorrow (8th July).

Youth Club Facilities

Mr. Fitzalan Howard said that the response to the questionnaire was extremely disappointing. 773 forms had been issued (including some by the school) and only 48 had been returned, representing a response rate of 6.2%. A mere ten people (1.3%) had said that they were prepared to be involved.

One parishioner raised concerns regarding "an increasing prevalence of

drug dealing in the village". It was felt by this person that the current skate park, at the top of the playing field, is in the wrong place and consideration should be given to it being relocated.

Affordable Housing Update

The Housing Need Survey is to be distributed by the Housing Association.

Brookside Development Update

It has been confirmed by the Parish Council that limited street lighting is required. Mr. Rayner said that the precise details, (how much and where), is to be negotiated with the developer.

Defibrillators

Miss Ferris has spoken to Mr. Lee, Chairman of Fulmodeston Parish Council, who have two defibrillators installed. The matter will be discussed at the September meeting.

Village Green Tree Planting Scheme

Mr. Grainger has received an acknowledgement from Norfolk County Council. Our interest has been registered.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee in 2022

The Jubilee in 2022 will involve an extended Bank Holiday weekend from 2nd to 5th June. There will be a national chain of Beacons to be lit at 9.15 pm on 2nd June. A further discussion will be held at next month's Parish Council meeting with a suggestion already having been made to hold a village party on the Green. It is not possible to accommodate a visit from the circus this year and Mr. Smith is to contact them. He will stress that they would be welcome at some other more suitable time.

Letter Re: Possible Land Purchase

A letter had been received from a parishioner who declared interest in purchasing parish land of approximately 10 or 11 acres, being a meadow near the church. This matter was given full consideration and the decision was taken that it is not in the best interests of the local community to sell at the present time.

Proposed by Mr. Fitzalan Howard and seconded by Mr. Labouchere. All in favour.

NORTH ELMHAM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

WEDNESDAY 4TH AUGUST

The following information is taken from the DRAFT PC minutes, the full official minutes can be viewed in the Post Office and on the Community website, once approved.

Councillors Present: Mrs. J. Borgnis (Chairman), Mr. M. Phillips, Mr. B. Gee, Miss A. Ferris, Mr. P. Grainger, Mrs. A. Keeble, Mr. J. Labouchere, Mr. N. Markwell, Mr. M. Rayner, Mr. C. Smith.

Also in Attendance: Mr. G. Bambridge (District Councillor), Mr. K. Webb (Clerk) and two parishioners.

Apologies: Mr. T. Fitzalan Howard

Public Participation

- a) A drain halfway down Church Hill is clogged with leaves. The Clerk will contact the County Council to request that this is attended to. In addition, a village sweep of the roads is overdue. The Flower Festival is to take place on the 25th and 26th of September and a request will be made of Breckland Council to carry out a sweep a week before this event.
- b) The current position regarding the affordable housing project was queried. The next stage is for a Housing Needs Survey to be carried out with Broadland Housing's aim being to deliver forms to parishioners on Friday, 10th September. A piece informing residents of the survey will be placed in Elmham News.
- c) It is some ten years since the Village Green was purchased. An undertaking was

given that the names of all contributors to the fund-raising would be displayed at the location. This has not yet happened. Precise details on how this will be achieved will be discussed fully at the next meeting.

Land Management Matters

Village Green: Mr. Smith said that the RoSPA report had provided several recommendations. In addition, there are three items requiring attention - the zip wire, the small slide and the climbing frame. The last item has already been fixed. Mr. Phillips is to contact NGF Play Ltd. The hedges will be cut after September 1st. Mr. Smith reported that the contractors have not been cutting and strimming in certain areas. The Chairman will contact them regarding this with a view to getting an Operations Manager to visit so that the problems can be clearly detailed. Mr. Smith said that some shots had apparently been fired near the Play Area. The matter is in the hands of the police. The circus is visiting the village between 30th August and 4th September.

Cathedral Ruins: Mrs. Keeble said that the slopes have not yet been cut.

Cathedral Meadows: Mr. Fitzalan Howard had forwarded a report. There has been no development yet on the disposal of brash from hedge cutting. Natural England will need to make a decision but, at this stage, there is no urgency. On the middle meadow, signs have been put up to divert the footpath a few meters to allow a small area of specific interest to wildflowers and insects to remain undisturbed. A new footpath has been established. Unfortunately, it has been noted that the rope has been removed from the area

Broom Green: Mr. Labouchere said that drainage work has still to be done but is in hand.

Bridleway on disused railway line and other railway linked matters: Breckland Council have advised that they will respond to our original letter at some stage.

Prince William Wood: Mr. Markwell said that the gateways had been tidied up. The parishioner who asked the question regarding a fire break has advised that he will not do the work himself. The Parish Council had made a manual contribution on an occasion in the past but there was no commitment to make this a regular occurrence. There is an intention to provide an additional dog waste bin and the Chairman will check with Breckland Council to ensure that they are content with this proposal.

Street Lights: The Parish Council is in favour of having some limited street lighting in the new Brookside development but has accepted that this is not realistic due to environmental issues involving the bats. Lighting for the car park and footbridge, however, is still required and will be pursued with the developer.

Highway Matters

Mr. Grainger reported that the outstanding Parish Partnership projects have been completed. A parishioner has voiced concerns about speeding traffic in Station Road. Police have been carrying out speed checks with a number of vehicles identified as travelling in excess of the limit. The police have said they will return to carry out further monitoring at a later date. A number of potholes near the Brookside development are to be repaired. Mr. Gee is to look into the possibility of having safety rails, perhaps by making use of the Parish Partnership scheme, outside the Post Office to protect people exiting.

Pavilion and Playing Field

The moles seem to have disappeared and the amount of rubbish at the top of the field has decreased. Local organisations have started using the pavilion again.

Youth Club Facilities

Research continues.

Eastgate Centre

The Centre is now open for bookings with relevant precautions in place.

Affordable Housing Update

The Housing Needs survey is to be distributed by the Housing Association (see "Public Participation" b).

Brookside Development Update

Please refer to item above.

Defibrillators

This matter will be discussed at the September meeting.

Village Green Tree Planting Scheme

Norfolk County Council has now advised that an application needs to be made to the Woodland Trust. The minimum number of trees for an applicant is 500! Mr. Bambridge said that Breckland's scheme provides 100 trees, free of charge, and he will inform Mr. Grainger of contact details.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee in 2022

This matter was carried forward to be discussed at the September meeting. In the meantime, it was agreed by all to form a small working group, led by Mr. Smith, and also including the Chairman and Mr. Gee.

CCTV Cameras

Mr. Labouchere, as agreed, had obtained a quotation for a CCTV surveillance system. This amounted to £1,362.00 (inc VAT). It was acknowledged that we would need a policy and a named administrator. In addition, there are GDPR considerations. It was also felt that concentrating on one area could put pressure on other parts of the village. As such, a parish project would be more appropriate. Mr. Grainger proposed that a vote be held, which was agreed by all, with three options:

a) A village project incorporating a number of cameras with a maximum spend of £10K.

Retrospective Planning Application

3PL/2021/0868/F - miniature railway

Following the Parish Council's objections to the application, a letter was sent by Mid-Norfolk Railway to the Development Management Planner at Breckland Council. As a result, a further objection is to be lodged with a view to addressing what are considered to be factual inaccuracies.

Mr. Bambridge is also to attempt to bring this application before the District Council's Planning Committee.

Correspondence

Among the correspondence were:

- a) E-mail from parishioner concerned with speeding and overtaking on Pump Street (problems were acknowledged but these are essentially matters for the police)
- b) E-mail from parishioner complaining that the village is "scruffy", as requested, the e-mail was read out. There is already awareness of the issues stated with action either taken or being planned. The phone boxes are to be repainted, the car park weeds are to be sprayed, hedges are to be cut (after September 1st) and Breckland will be lending litter pick kits.

As I'm certain many of us may have noticed while taking our daily 'Covid' stroll through the village over the summer a solitary worker has been restoring the estate wall along the Holt Road. Peter Trent from Great Ryburgh a long experienced Flint worker took a well deserved break to tell me about his craft and the techniques he is employing to bring the wall back to its former glory.

The wall dates back to the 1840s when Elmham House was remodelled explained Peter. Naturally being Norfolk, the material of choice was locally sourced flint with red bricks that would also have come from the area.

Peter went on to show me the 'core' of the wall made from an assortment of what by today's standards would be classed as building rubble. He says the wall would have been built in part using materials from demolished buildings such as the row of cottages that ran on a street parallel to Holt Road. Bricks sizes where not standardised until the 1850s and he showed me pieces of Tudor bricks he had discovered.

The wall would have been built up from both sides with the core at the same time. When looking at the back Peter suggested that apprentices could have made that side which is less commonly seen!

Flint work is ever common in Norfolk especially on modern properties as features . However, the flint work on the estate wall is structural not decorative – each flint being strategically placed to supply strength to the structure. Peter showed me how when positioning a flint, it is chosen to touch the adjoining on

all sides. This gets more complex at the top of the wall where smaller flints have to be found to fill the last course. But of course the magic ingredient that holds the whole thing together is the authentic lime mortar that Peter makes and brings to site in large plastic containers. It has to be mixed very carefully because of its volatile nature.

One of the reasons for the very necessary repair work that Peter is undertaking is due to previous repairs using cement instead of lime mortar. Cement does not have any expansion qualities when set so when water does penetrate the wall and freezes it expands and pushes flints outwards.

The mortar which is the consistency of thick ice cream is applied carefully and generously around each flint. After it has started to 'go off' Peter points up around each to give a very pleasing result. This is a different technique to that seen on modern buildings whereas much flint as possible is left visible.

Another surprising fact that Peter brought to my attention the brick details that are seen at approx 6m intervals are actually there for a purpose. They allow the wall to expand and contract naturally. It is interesting that they understood about expansion in the 1840s. If they weren't there the wall could be liable to cracking even with lime mortar.

As much as I had enjoyed chatting to a traditional Norfolk craftsman, I had to let him return to his work which will be there for a long time in the future admired by all who pass by.

NEW EXCEPTION HOUSING SCHEME

You may have read about plans for an affordable housing scheme in the Parish Council minutes. As part of this process, it is hoped that residents will support the plans to provide housing to meet local needs. It will be really helpful if you would complete and return a Housing Needs Survey, which will be posted to you to arrive on your doormat close to Friday 10th September. The survey should be returned using the pre-paid envelope which comes with it.

Exception housing schemes are allowed on land that would not otherwise be permitted for development. Sites need to physically adjoin the built-up area of a village (the settlement boundary). Once the local housing need has been established (that's why it's important to have as many returned surveys as possible!) there will be a call for sites, so that landowners can put forward potential sites for consideration. The survey will help to decide how many and what type of housing we need in North Elmham.

The Parish Council has selected Broadland Housing Association to deliver a 'local needs' housing scheme for North Elmham. Broadland Housing is an award-winning local housing association, providing 5,000 homes across Norfolk with area office in Dereham.

What is proposed?

Broadland is proposing three types of housing tenure:

- affordable rent (rents set at 80% of market, capped at the Local Housing Allowance)
- shared ownership (where leaseholders buy an initial equity share and pay rent on the remainder)
- market homes (unfortunately Government grants do not fully fund the

affordable rented homes. So, Broadland is proposing that approximately a third of the overall development will be sold on the open market, to generate surplus funds that will cross-subsidise the affordable homes)

People in housing need who have a local connection will get first priority for the affordable homes.

Once the housing need has been established, we'll be publicising how potential sites can be put forward.

SCRAPBOOK MEMORIES

Found in a scrapbook from the early 1950's.

Cricketers All North Elmham Can Be Proud Of Its Record

In a village which has won the Mid Norfolk Shield more than twice the number of times of any other village in the League, you can expect to find more than the usual percentage of cricketing enthusiasts. As it is, in North Elmham the difficulty is to find any man over 40 who has not played for the village at some time or other. Get a few old timers together and you will hear countless yarns of sixes dropping onto the Kings Head

bowling green and fierce struggles with the neighbouring clubs – in those days – at Billingford and Swanton Morley.

How did Elmham win the shield ten times? Mr Dick Hewett who was playing cricket at the turn of the century and captained the 1st X1 for ten years, can give the answer. 'It was training that did it' he claims. 'Old Tom Case – one of Elmham's most famous captains – who died recently at the age of 80 had us boys out on the Green Field every night of the week. We had two nets, and each man had ten minutes with the bat. We got so many along that we didn't have time to give everyone a turn. That gives you an idea of how keen we were in those days.

Nowadays says Mr Hewett, you see a cricketer on the field during the week. If they get a good ball as soon as they go in on Saturday, that's their batting finished for another seven days. A village this size should be able to produce a first class team. The spirit of the game has improved since the old days, and that's a good thing but the youngsters are not as keen as they were' he claims.'

His opinion is shared by many of the old villagers who turned out for Elmham in the days when every match, as Mr Hewett puts it, was treated like a Yorkshire – Lancashire battle. There is little Ben Reeve, well known in most of the villages in Mid Norfolk, and in Dereham as well, as a cricketer, a footballer and a runner before the first World War. There is Mr Olly Smith, one of the most useful players Elmham has had. There is Mr J. Bradfield, the village butcher who captained the Reserves when the late Mr Frank Kerrison, then the village grocer, captained the first X1.

Mr Bradfield tells the story of how the Reserves challenged Billingford about 34 years ago, after they had beaten Elmham's senior team four times that season and how they scored 30 and then dismissed Billingford for less than 20. A providential Thunderstorm prevented Billingford

getting their revenge in a second innings, and an exultant Reserves team made the 1st X1 members' lives miserable for months afterwards

And there is Mr Bertie Marsh, another stalwart of the early days, whose family has been carrying on Elmham's cricketing tradition ever since. His two sons George and Fred, have given years of service to the club and their cousin John is another regular player.

Mr George Marsh was either Captain or Secretary or both from 1931 to 1947. During that time he collected a host of medals and set up records which are still unbeaten. Playing against Swanton Morley on the Green Field in one hour and five minutes he scored 99 runs. And in a Fisher Cup final against Bircham, against a bowler who was reckoned to be 'Unplayable' he scored 32 runs in the first over.

His brother Fred still turns out for the Club but his finest performances were at Dereham when he bowled regularly for the Town. On his mantelpiece at home is a clock presented to him in 1946 for taking 117 wickets in the season for an average of 8.6 runs each. His pace has slowed a little at the age of 39, and a leg injury has been causing him trouble but he was still able to take two wickets in last week's Fisher Cup final.

Throughout the years the cricket centre of Elmham has been the Green Field, a piece of land which the Parish Council bought in 1913. Only recently was it discovered when plans were discussed at a parish meeting to improve it, that according to the terms of the Smallholdings and Allotments Act of 1908, it was illegal for football or cricket to be played on it.

For many years, therefore Elmham Cricket Club has been unwittingly breaking the law. The players will be relieved to hear that this week the Parish Council was notified that the land had been transferred to another Act which makes games legal. A committee headed by Mr George Marsh is going ahead with arrangements for a bulldozer to level the field, and by next season the club should have a first –class ground. Perhaps if the spirit of the old days can be revived it will have a first class team as well.

ELMHAM ARCHIVES

Our Archives, with lots of photographs and maps, will be on view at the Flower Festival in September. If you are interested in our local history, please come and visit the church and go into the St John's Room and look at part of our collection of photographs and maps of the village. We have a growing collection of memorabilia which is ongoing, being collected from old newspapers and photographs from people who live in the village and who have donated various snaps from the past for us to share.

As well as the old buildings, which are sometimes hard to recognise, as are the roads and the fashion of clothes which clearly show that Elmham was a farming village, not up to date in the fashion stakes!

Please come in and have a chat as you look around, we are always ready to talk about our lovely village.

WILDLIFE AT THE CATHEDRAL MEADOWS

Last month I mentioned Cuckoo Bees and this month it's the turn of Cuckoo Wasps. Cuckoo Wasps lay their eggs in the nests of other types of wasp but for me it's not so much their behaviour that fascinates me as their appearance. Also known as Jewel Wasps, they are clothed from head to tail in brilliant metallic turquoise-green splendour, their heavily-sculptured surface comprising a myriad of tiny bumps that catch the light and reflect their colour such that the little insects look like they are smothered in glistening emeralds. And that's the plain species. On others, known as Ruby-tailed Wasps, the tail is blushing cerise-pink as if the emeralds have been replaced by rubies. This shining pink and green combination is found on several different insects from completely unrelated families, like the exquisite Willow Flea Beetle which you can also find at the meadows. As I looked through the insects feeding on the Hogweed flowers recently I found another even more striking variation on the bedazzling Cuckoo Wasp theme. Like the others, this insect's whole head and body was covered in jewels, but this time it wasn't just the tail that was pink, the shoulders were pink too (photo 1). This pattern is shared by several cuckoo wasps that haven't been assigned common names so if I'm going to tell you which one this was (I can't not - it would be really bad form to leave that information out) I'm afraid I shall have to use it's rather less sparkly scientific name, Hedychrum niemelai.

It's proving to be quite a mediocre year for moths. In fact that's being generous, but I have managed to catch a few interesting moths on the odd occasion. Among them was a Herald (photo 2) a unique moth that is easily recognised by its bright orange colour, it's broad wings with a scalloped rear edge and two pairs of tiny but conspicuous pure white spots on the wings. Other delights that

night included the bronzy-green Large Clover Case-bearer and the large yellow Swallow-tailed Moth. Another attractive insect I found at the meadows recently was a yellow leafhopper with a unique arrangement of dark spots and lines near the end of its wings (photo 3). It's another one where I have to use its scientific name (Eurhadina pulchella) as it hasn't been assigned a common name.

I'm not generally a big fan of spiders. Not only am I a little bit arachnophobic but many of them are also very difficult to identify to species, often requiring microscopic examination with only the adults possible at all (and invariably I seem to find immature ones). Occasionally I find a spider that looks so distinctive that I figure even I might have a chance of identifying it and one such individual turned out to be something called a Cricket Bat Spider (photo 4). The dark marking on its body is supposed to resemble a cricket bat – judge for yourself whether you think it does. According to the British Spiders website it's mainly found on heaths and open woodland, but I wouldn't describe the place where I found it as either. It's mostly found in the south of England with relatively few dots on the records map as far north as Norfolk.

Among the bird sightings during the last month, another view of a Red Kite was probably the highlight although they aren't nearly as rare as they once were. Another raptor that is now common in Norfolk but which you would have been lucky to see here 30 years ago is the Buzzard (photo 5) – it's now possible to see up to a dozen in the air together over the meadows in spring, with smaller numbers present throughout the year.


If you asked me what my favourite wildflower was I would probably give you a different answer each time, but Common Centaury would always be high up on the list of contenders. Their clusters of perfect-pink flowers are delicately







placed above a pleasing green stem and leaves but they're flowers that I haven't found at the meadows before. This summer I found one growing along the railway at the bottom of the meadows (photo 6). There's a much better display of them a bit further up the railway in the open area north of the County School station orchard, but finding this one plant here for the first time was enough to give me a little rush of adrenaline.



When I first became interested in dragonflies you had to travel to a particular site in the Brecks if you wanted to see a Scarce Emerald Damselfly in Norfolk (photo 7). I knew they had been seen at one new site more recently but I hadn't realised they'd undergone a significant range expansion. So I was perhaps a bit more excited than I ought to have been when I discovered a colony of them here in North Elmham. They weren't quite at the meadows, but very close – by the small pond in Church Meadow.

So, finally, after sixteen months of no passenger trains, we were able to start running again in July and how nice it is to hear the sounds of a steam locomotive pulling out of Dereham Station with a rake of restored carriages behind it! Our first major event was the Vintage Bus Day on 1st August, and I hope you may have spotted some of the vintage buses making their way through the village en route to and from County School Station during the day. Our second event was last weekend, the 7th and 8th August, with our 1940s Weekend when large numbers of visitors arrived in period costume, there were battle re-enactments at Dereham Station and even spam sandwiches on sale at our Tea Room there. No further news as yet about the permissiveness of the footpath from the buffer stop north of North Elmham level crossing to County School, hopefully this will arrive in the not too distant future. WANT TO LEARN TO PLAY MAH-JONG?

The game originated in China toward the end of 19th Century and became popular in the west in the 1920's. One of my aunts was brought up in Hong Kong where it was one of the pastimes to learn along with Bridge. Her own children learnt to play, as did the rest of the family on her return to Scotland. The family began teaching and playing with friends that were interested to learn.

Mah-Jong is a traditional Chinese strategy game played, usually by four people, with 136 or 144 rectangular pieces called tiles. It is a game that involves skill, strategy, and luck. The object being to collect winning sets of these tiles, as in card games such as gin rummy. Each game is scored, the winner is the one with the highest score at the end of the evening.

Mah-Jong is now played all around the world. However, it has meant that it has evolved with many variants and different rules. Playing Mah-Jong in the Far East will be different from playing Mah-Jong in USA, or Europe for that matter. There used to be a saying that for every set of Mah-Jong bought, there would be another set of rules. Even within a wider family there could be slight variations, different ways of calling for example, as I found when I set up a couple of groups in Scotland with my cousin (whose mother was my aunt from Hong Kong). We played the same game, but over the decades the two branches called differently. In fact, it became etiquette for players who have not played together prior to the game, to agree to play by the 'rules of the house' to avoid confusion and squabbles.

Therefore, starting up the beginner groups, it was decided to follow the rules laid down by the UK Mah-jong Association (UKMA). The UKMA states it is keen to see all

versions of the game played more widely in the UK, but it was easier for us to teach using the same terms.

It may look complicated initially to an onlooker, but even children as young as seven years of age can be taught to the play the game. It is a lot of fun and very social.

So, if you want to learn to play, then contact number below. Even if you are not sure come along for a taster. Currently we meet informally on every Wednesday evening at 7.30 pm finishing between 9.45–10.00 pm.

However, if enough interest is generated, alternative arrangements will be made to accommodate the needs of a second group, such as playing on an alternative night, and whether collectively as a group they wish to meet weekly, fortnightly or monthly.






